MURAL DEDICATION

The California Heights Welcome Mural, located on the corner of Orange Avenue and Wardlow Road, will be officially dedicated and unveiled at 11:00 a.m. on March 20, 2004.

The mural, under the direction of Janet Anderson and Heather Green, was prepared and painted during a three-month period. Resident volunteers helped to sand, scrape and paint the wall to prepare it for the artist, Art Mortimer. Art Mortimer designed and painted the mural in the style of a vintage crate label. It features barley and lima bean fields, oil wells, California Heights homes, the Long Beach shoreline and our own local children.

The 7th District Council Office, under Ray Grabinski, initially provided the seed money to hire an artist and develop the mural design in 2001. Soon after prints of the mural were made available for purchase to help the raise funds needed to complete the mural project. In addition, California Heights received a generous grant from the Public Corporation for the Arts.

We would like to thank Janet Anderson, Albert Guerra, Heather Green, Kerrie Weaver and the many volunteers who donated their time to work on the mural. We would especially like to thank Art Mortimer for his wonderful mural highlighting the best of California Heights.


Wanted: Historic Cal Heights Photos

We would be happy to come and pick them up and return them to you, unharmed within 48 hours. Our own Newsletter staff would do all the scanning.







Cal Heights Seems to be an Easy Prey For Criminals. Isn't It Time For You To Get Involved?

From May to December of 2003, an alarming amount of criminal activity has occurred in or near California Heights There were 22 car thefts, 13 residential burglaries and 29 cars burglarized in that eight-month period.

I found out about eight of the car burglaries and two of the home invasions while chatting with my neighbors. Alarmed, I spoke to Marlene Arrona, with the LBPD, at a recent CHNA community meeting. She referred me to Lisa Massacani, also with the LBPD, who provided me with the crime statistics in California Heights that were mentioned above.

I have asked Lisa Massacani to speak to our community, at a special neighborhood meeting, about the Neighborhood Watch Program. Participation requires minimal involvement and two to six meetings per year. The overview meeting, regarding Neighborhood Watch, will be on March 11th from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Jan's Antiques, located at 1133 E. Wardlow Road. I will have copies of the crime statistics of each neighborhood available for attendees that include information on murder, rape, arson, robbery etc.


We thank the California Heights Association for all the hard work they have put into our community. The entire city is blessed to have you.



Useful Tips On Researching The History of Your Historic Home

Start at Long Beach City Hall...

Pull all of the building permits to help to establish the building date. You may need to be flexible on the address because addresses can change over the years. There is a nominal charge to print out the permits.

Use the city directory and look up the address to find the owner's name.

Look up the owner to find out their profession and where they worked. You can look forward in time in the city directories to determine who else lived in the house. You can also have a search done of the historical local newspapers by the library staff.

Try searching on the house address and/or owner names. A good source of information on previous owners is obituarys. Once you have a date of death you can search for obituary articles on microfilm.

Check Southwest Builder and Contractor to determine who designed and built the home.

• The Southwest Builder and Contractor magazine included descriptions of the building permits as they were recorded. These descriptions often included a description of the house, the builder and architect.



- Get the magazine records for the year the house was built. Scan forward in the records until you find the Long Beach News Notes section. In the Long Beach News Notes section there is a Long Beach Permits section, here you can find the description of the house's building permit.
- You can also locate microfilm records of the Southwest Builder and Contractor magazine at the Los Angeles Downtown Library on the bottom floor, and at USC where they have the physical magazines located on the top shelf on the back wall.

REMINISCING

My parents, Joseph J. and Cecelia E. Sparks, purchased 1016 East 36th Street on July 21, 1926. I was raised there from my birth on August 30, 1927.

When we moved 14 years later, just before WWII, it was to our "new" home at 3801 Rose at the corner of Bixby Road, just outside the California Heights boundary. I left Southern California in 1955, after graduating UCLA Law School, and moved to the San Francisco Bay area.

I have vivid memories of the 1933 earthquake and my mother being unable to gain access to my younger brother and me because the bedroom door jammed. Mom (5 ft tall and 101 pounds) broke the bedroom window screen with her elbow and hauled us out. She laid us on blankets in the vacant lot to the west of our house, now occupied by a house on the southwest corner

of California and 36th.

I remember seeing the fires and old wooden oil wells teetering on Signal Hill and small cracks opening in the ground. We slept that night in our car and spent the next several days in Azusa until the power and water came back on. My mother used to tell me that she could stand on the back porch and watch my father head south on Orange heading for their cleaning and dying business on 7th and Obispo. There were no houses in the way to block her view.

In the picture, which faces west, I'm the little guy. Look at the oil wells! I remember we used to stick matches or toothpicks in the wooden sash windows to keep them from rattling at night. The rattling was caused by the vibration from drilling in the oil fields. The smells and sounds were part of my childhood and still bring back happy memories.
