A Future for Willow Gulch?

Most of YOU have driven past Willow Gulch without giving it a glance. Why would you? From the street, there's not much to see. Bounded by California, Orange, Spring and the cemetery along Willow, the 55 acre site is used primarily by Signal Hill Petroleum for access to oil wells and as a catch basin for 405 Freeway runoff. In 1933 it accommodated the rubble from hundreds of buildings that failed in the Long Beach earthquake, and more recently it was considered for the now defunct sports park, doomed by a lack of funding. The rusting Amerigas plant at Orange and Spring finally came down last fall, and Sasha Kanno, of Wrigley Garden fame, is in the midst of cultivating a small urban farm on the site near 28th and California.

On December 11th, Councilmember Johnson invited active community members to tour the site, led by Larry Rich, City of Long Beach Sustainability Coordinator, who has been introducing locals to the history and future possibilities of Willow Gulch for the past several years. Once enveloped by the rolling nature of the property, we quickly lost sight of the city surrounding us and began to understand how the land could become a gem of an urban oasis where residents and visitors might escape the hustle and bustle of urban life.

We learned that Willow Gulch got its name from a natural spring that ran to the LA River, lined the entire way with native willow trees. In fact, the area near the Willow Blue Line stop was home to a small farming community called Willowville, dubbed "Hicksville" by higher society Long Beach folks. To remove the stigma, the residents cut down the trees and eventually covered over the creek altogether. Today it lives on only in the names of Willow Avenue and Spring Street, where drivers speed by, oblivious to the history in their midst.

The rolling topography and a steep hillside along the eastern edge that contains the second highest point in Long Beach were an expensive obstacle for the sports park. Uplifted by the Newport Inglewood fault, Willow Gulch rests along a chain of hills that stretch from Cal State Long Beach through Alamitos Heights and the inclines near PCH and Redondo, to Signal Hill, through Cal Heights and Bixby Knolls and off to Dominguez Hills. "Why flatten one of the most topographically interesting sites in our city?" asked Mr. Johnson. Limiting grading significantly reduces expenses while preserving the hills that lend shelter and unique character to our mostly flat cityscape.

We'll keep you posted on progress for possible plans at Willow Gulch, where reduced activity has given rise to a young crop of willow trees already reestablishing themselves! president's message A MESSAGE FROM JOHN ROYCE

Long Beach Airport – Right-sized and Ready for Takeoff!

Well, maybe not ready for takeoff just yet, but recent media coverage reported that major terminal improvements at Long Beach Airport (LGB) began with a groundbreaking ceremony in December. There's no hiding the fact that our neighborhood is impacted by airport operations. Had everyone known back in the 1920s what the future of aviation held, the airport would surely have located near the port. Crystal balls would be so helpful, wouldn't they? The fact remains that today we are left with the task of making the best of a less than ideal situation.

Arguments were numerous and cases were made for many options, from grandiose to nothing at all, to removing the whole thing altogether. Ultimately, it landed somewhere in between. We take our hats off to all who worked and debated until a sane compromise sealed the deal. It wasn't going to go away and over-the-top visions made too many people nervous about the costs, not to mention concerns about inviting growth, despite limitations from a fairly powerful noise ordinance that currently caps commercial flights at 41 per day and commuter flights at 20.

Planned renovations are extensive, providing more room for passenger screening and holding areas with modern services and comfort while preserving the unique sense of historic character and convenience that makes our airport so attractive in the first place. While many travelers who use LGB have no plans to visit or spend money in Long Beach and see it simply as an alternative to more expensive John Wayne and crowded LAX, we will provide a much more welcoming environment for those who do, one residents and local businesses can be proud of.

While Federal law prohibits airport profits from leaving the airport, jobs and services do affect local employment and business operations, and convenient access to air travel can be an important tool to attract certain business sectors to our city. More than 1800 jobs will be supported or created as construction continues through the next several years. Fringe benefits from some of the design and operations renovations will also be seen in air quality improvements and offsets in energy use due to the extensive installation of solar panels.

Now, if only we can convince Allegiant air to abandon the noisy MD-80 jets that we were all so happy to say good-bye to when American Airlines left Long Beach ...

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Seismic Testing to Resume

Several years ago many of our residents raised concerns when "earthquake trucks" rumbled through our neighborhood. Hired by Signal Hill Petroleum to search for oil beneath the city's surface, public outreach proved lacking and the forces generated by the operation caught many by surprise and even led some residents to complain about cracked plaster, stucco and broken objects. Diane Ripley, Signal Hill Petroleum's public relations representative, explained that this time around, Signal Hill Petroleum has essentially formed its own company to carry out the task, with hopes of doing a better job informing and preparing the community, while employing the latest technology that limits ground forces and significantly reduces the vibrations experienced by residents and their homes.

While an exact start date has not been announced, rest assured that in the near future, seismic testing will come to our neighborhood. You may have already noticed the little green sensors that were placed along public rights of way and parkways. Routes in and around Cal Heights will include Bixby and Wardlow roads, E 36th Street, and Atlantic, Orange and Cherry avenues.

CHNA will do our best to notify our residents via our "What's Up" and "Resident Alert" emails (sign up at calheights.org/contact.htm) as well as our California Heights Neighborhood Association Facebook page. CHNA has been assured that a Signal Hill Petroleum public relations representative will be on site at all times, will be knocking on doors as they advance and will cease operations immediately if problems occur.

Farm Box Pickups at Bella Cosa!

Do you miss the Sunday Farmers' Market? Now there's another way to get fresh, locally grown seasonal produce. Many of you are already familiar with Bella Cosa at Bixby and Atlantic. Showcasing beautifully repurposed items, unique gifts, clothing, classes, cookie and soup swap events and more. It's also become a popular venue for First Fridays. Now this locally owned and operated shop has teamed up with another local entity to provide fresh and convenient deliveries of local produce. Sasha Kanno of Wrigley's Farm Lot 59 will deliver your Beach Greens box to Bella Cosa each Wednesday for you to pick up.

Farm boxes are a slightly different size than Beach Green's regular home delivery boxes and cannot be modified. You will receive 7 different types of vegetables, 2 herbs, and 2-3 different types of fruit. Only the freshest local, in-season produce will be harvested and packed for you. Farm boxes are \$30 per week and can be ordered weekly or biweekly with a monthly commitment.

Medical Marijuana on Wardlow Road

The medical marijuana dispensaries on Wardlow Road continue to be a concern for some of our residents. At the January 18th City Council session, Council voted to adopt the ordinance, amended to include public parks in the restrictions already adopted and reported in our last issue. A delay in implementation was caused when the amendments were requested by the 3rd, 4th and 5th District Councilmembers.

Remaining dispensaries that made it through the lottery process will now be required to go through the permit process to address potential health, building and other code requirements and violations, including signage and entrance locations.

There is one dispensary that opened in one of the vacated shops in clear violation of the ordinance and one that failed to close as required. Each of these illegal businesses has been issued citations. In addition, the property owners of the buildings that house these illegal dispensaries have been notified of noncompliance. Further action by the City Prosecutor, City Attorney, LBPD, and Financial Management will be taken as deemed appropriate.

Councilmember Johnson has pledged his determination to close illegally operating dispensaries post haste.

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



Turn over buckets and unused flower pots, keep your rain barrels screened, and remove water from tarps, spare tires and pool covers. Replace non circulating water in bird baths twice per week. Report stagnant swimming pools to Vector Control at 570-4132 and follow the recorded instructions. You can press "0" during the recording to talk to a clerk Monday-Friday from 8am-5pm or you can leave a message. *

Recycling aluminum cans reduces the need for destructive bauxite mining in the world's rainforests. Each can recycled saves enough energy to run a TV for four hours. Common tin cans (actually steel) can be used to manu-

facture everything from car parts to building materials. Each ton recycled conserves 2,500 pounds of iron ore, 1,400 pounds of coal, and 120 pounds of limestone.

While plastics tend to be down-cycled, or turned into something of less value, doing so reduces the need for petroleum products and produces less greenhouse gas emissions. Glass bottles and jars can be recycled endlessly with no loss in quality. In the US about 35% of glass beverage containers were recycled, but in California it's nearly 80%.

Americans use over 700 pounds of paper per person each year. If all morning newspapers in the US were recycled, 41,000 trees daily and 6 million tons of waste would not end up in landfills.

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
