

So, I hope you are all making some fun, lasting memories this summer. Make some plans, steel some moments, and have a happy and healthy summer of 09.




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Restoration Trade Fair & Great Homes of LB

Urban Coyotes

Thanks to everyone who made it to the coyote meeting to voice their concerns and find out more about what we can do to help solve this dilemma.

Coyotes have always been a part of our local environment, living in and around flood control areas, wetlands and other open spaces. Coyotes typically shy away from populated areas; however, if tempted by easy food sources, they can be invited into our neighborhoods.

Do not leave pet food outdoors, keep your trash cans covered, please keep smaller pets indoors from dawn to dusk, pick up fallen fruit, and report feral cat infestations.

Feral cats and kittens are a sad reminder of how irresponsibility breeds tragedy; please have your animals spade and neutered. It's the law. Preventing feral cats significantly reduces a primary attractant for coyotes.

Animal Care Services will deal with the two daytime area coyotes that are causing much concern. But there still are, and always have been coyotes in our midst. If we want to teach them to stay away, then we must remove the attractants. Together we can be part of the solution – a method that has been proven effective over and over again. Please help spread the word to your neighbors.

Neighborhood Watch

At nearly every quarterly meeting with LBPD North Division's Commander Quach, as well as our regular reports from Officer Brown at our community meetings, we are told to report suspicious behavior and activities that are out of the ordinary. It stands to reason that if we know our neighbors and their regular activities well, then we have a much better chance of noticing what is out of the ordinary. One of the best ways to know your neighbors is by forming block by block Neighborhood Watches.

While crime in our area remains near twenty year lows and our neighborhood has a solid reputation as a safe community, we are still part of a vast urban complex, one that is being hit hard by the current economic recession. Crimes of opportunity are an unfortunate side effect of these conditions.

Please help our Long Beach Police Department help you by talking to your neighbors and consider forming a watch for your block. Contact Lisa at 570.7229. The number is always posted on the "Community Contact" page at CalHeights.org. She is eager to help you get started. Once your group has held four meetings, you will be eligible for new Neighborhood Watch signs to be posted at the ends of your block.

In the meantime, if you do witness suspicious activity, don't assume someone else will report it. Call 911 immediately. If you are within the Long Beach city limits, a 911 call from your cell phone will now go directly to LBPD dispatch instead of the CHP for all major carriers. Please be prepared to give as complete descriptions as possible about persons and vehicles in question: race, sex, age, hair color, clothing, vehicle color, make, type, etc., their location and if no longer there, the direction of travel last noted.

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What Is Old Can Be New Again

For the more "seasoned citizens" of Southern California, O' Keefe and Merritt appliances are as familiar as GE and Kitchen Aid are to more recent generations. Dating back to post World War II Los Angeles, when Parkie O'Keefe and Robert Merritt opened a factory on Olympic Blvd., O'Keefe and Merritt stoves became a mainstay of homes throughout the region, including Long Beach. Boasting state of art technology, the prices ranged from \$29.50 to \$173.50 and were "built to last." Sadly, the company is long gone, however, their products that were "built to last," need not be only a fond memory.

When the opportunity arouse for me to return to Southern California, I was intent on purchasing and living in a historical home. Long Beach, and California Heights in particular, was the logical place to start and I was fortunate to find a home on Gaviota Avenue that was built in 1937 and contained many of its original attributes. To my disappointment, however, the stove had been replaced by a perfectly fine, however mundane, modern appliance.

I immediately began my quest to find an O'Keefe and Merritt stove. I had used one for years growing up in Downey, and then later in an apartment on Ocean Blvd. in Belmont Shore. After moving and using more modern stoves, I was flabbergasted that recipes that had been baked flawlessly in the old stoves, now never seemed to be as well baked or roasted as in the O'Keefe and Merritt ovens. Even the griddle on those stoves cleaned up like a dream-and no Teflon!

I was fortunate to find a 1950, four burner, porcelain topped, 38" model on Craig's List for \$150. After bargaining the seller down to \$125, I drove to Templeton, CA and picked it up-I was rather disappointed. It had been in a barn for five years, was rusted and full of walnuts and rat droppings, missing a drip tray and oven knob. Still, I had heard that miracles could be accomplished on stoves in worse shape than this one and had high hopes for it being returned to its original glory.

I contacted Jim Noyes at Bond's Stove Works, 965 E. 4th St., Long Beach (562-432-8757). Jim came to my home, and upon examination, pronounced the patient a "good deal" and began dismantled all the parts that needed to be re-chromed or painted and left me the shell. Fortunately, all the wiring appeared operational (these stoves were built to last!) Jim gave me an estimate and said that he would be back in about a week. In the meantime, I bought a can of Easy Off oven cleaner, and began scrubbing, polishing and

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disinfecting what was left behind. After removing what was easily 40 years of dirt and grease, the old girl was shining like a new penny.


True to his word, Jim was back about a week later with all the parts he had taken, plus a new oven knob and griddle for the pitted one that could not be saved. He spent about 3 hours installing the parts, cleaning and attaching the lines and calibrating the oven. I felt like a kid on Christmas morning when I saw the finished product-that old stove looked like it had never left my little kitchen and shined like it was right off the showroom floor. I took her for a test run--brownies that were baked to perfection!

For his efforts, Jim charged about \$1,000, bringing my total investment to \$1,125. While much more than the original \$50 it would have cost in 1950, a bargain nonetheless. Fully restored O'Keefe and Merritt stoves can run between \$4,000 to \$6500 and can be easily found on the internet.

While these prices may be daunting and most of us are grateful for modern conveniences, the importance of maintaining the historical integrity of the inside, as well as the outside of our wonderful homes cannot be discounted, especially when the old is as good, if not better than the new. Old gems like O'Keefe and Merritt stoves should be used proudly, and not relegated to the junk heap. With a little elbow grease, and the talents of fine craftsmenship, this can be accomplished with most satisfying results. *

Our Young Trees Need You!

As the weather heats up, don't forget the young trees on your parkway. Just like us, they need water to get them through the hot days of summer, but not as much as you might think.

If your trees are recently planted, they will benefit greatly from twice monthly deep soaks. Fill up the watering basin with water and let it soak in, and repeat three times. This will ensure that the water will soak in well to encourage roots to grow deeply, enhancing drought tolerance and speeding their maturity. Once your trees are over a year old, a monthly soak will be plenty. After five years, most trees, if they have been properly nurtured, will only need supplemental water a few times during the warm months.
