## Lamppost Restoration Update

The CHNA is happy to report we have been awarded a Long Beach Navy Memorial Heritage Association grant in the amount of \$35,000.00. This grant, in conjunction with the \$10,000 in Home Tour revenue pledged, will allow us to hopefully finish the restoration project in 2014. As most of you know, this has been an ongoing project and the focus of the CHNA fundraising for over 10 years. We are so excited to see the light (no pun intended!) at the end of the tunnel.

We will not be able to complete the restoration without additional support from the neighborhood. In 2012, we offered a "two-fer" program for sponsorships that was quite successful and we will be doing the same with this installation. This program allows residents to sponsor one lamppost for \$725 and the CHNA will sponsor a second lamppost at no cost. The paid sponsorship includes the engraved service door plaque. The "free" lamppost does not include a plaque. The plaques have four spaces suitable for engraving so you can pool your resources with your neighbors and get two restored lampposts on your block. In 2012, neighbors did just this and Lemon Avenue managed to complete their entire street as well as other "two-fer" restorations throughout the neighborhood.

Again, we want to give a big, well deserved thanks to the residents who have supported the restoration through the years. The "two-fer" program will help some streets who have been lagging behind in their restoration efforts to achieve completion. These streets include Myrtle, Lewis, Brayton, Gundry, and Falcon Avenues. If residents who live on these streets could have someone step up as a block captain to solicit donations for a sponsorship, the donations will go twice as far with the "two-fer" program!

Many streets in the neighborhood are completed and we all enjoy how beautiful they look. This is a great opportunity for community building and getting to know your neighbors. We hope everyone in Cal Heights supports this last big push for completion of the restoration project. The engraved plaques are a wonderful way to commemorate a special person, event or even pets! The donation is tax deductible.

The next time you walk through Cal Heights, please take the time to read some of the plagues. It will warm your heart and it is a reminder of what a great neighborhood we live in.

## **Long Beach Election Season**

Long Beach faces a major primary nominating election on April 8th, with no less than fifteen offices on the ballot and one ballot measure deciding whether or not to tax medical marijuana sales. Candidates for the offices of Mayor, Council Districts 1, 3, 5, our own District 7, and 9, City Attorney, City Prosecutor, LB Community College District Board of Trustees areas 1, 3, and 5, and Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education areas 1 and 3.

Several forums have offered voters opportunities to become familiar with the candidates and issues, including two at the Petroleum Club, a mayoral forum sponsored by the Los Cerritos Neighborhood Association and LBHUSH2, and a 7<sup>th</sup> Council District forum sponsored by the Los Cerritos Neighborhood Association and the California Heights Neighborhood Association. We thank the Petroleum Club for offering our local organizations free use of their facilities. Voters may view the Padnet televised and streamed 7<sup>th</sup> Council District forum at padnet.tv/elections/.

Early voters and permanent vote by mail voters have been submitting ballots since March  $10^{th}$ . The last day to register for the election was March  $24^{th}$ . Complete election info can be accessed at longbeach.gov/cityclerk/elections/.



# Long Beach Water Reinstates Drought Restrictions

Despite our very welcomed recent soaking rains, California still faces a severe water shortage. As a result Long Beach Water Department has declared the city "under imminent water supply shortage" and has returned to the Monday, Thursday, Saturday, before 9am and after 4pm schedule that helped reduce water consumption in Long Beach during the last crisis. Long Beach Water continues to encourage water conservation with its popular Lawn to Garden Incentive Program, landscape classes and rebates for high-efficiency washing machines, toilets and water-saving sprinkler heads. From the 7<sup>th</sup> District

Dear Friends,

Recently, we were the first Council District to pilot "participatory democracy" here in Long Beach. We asked you to decide how to spend \$200,000 of one-time funds, and you responded. When we tallied all the votes, the projects in first through third place were extremely close. Here are the results:

Sidewalk Repairs (in addition to the \$521,173 being spent in 2014): \$60,000

Priority 1 Project: Sports Court Resurfacing (\$83,750)

Priority 2 Project: Neighborhood Tree Trimming (\$10,000)

Priority 3 Project: Interior Library Repairs (\$50,000)

The repairs will begin in 2014, helping to move Long Beach forward. I want to thank everyone who attended the February 25th workshop, whose input will be incorporated into the completion of these projects, and everyone who took the time to vote online, by mail, or by voting at the various polling stations throughout the district. Also, another first comes to the 7th District -- LED lights. After piloting these new lights in a residential neighborhood in West Long Beach, we will be installing all new LED lights on Santa Fe Avenue from Wardlow Road to Pacific Coast Highway. These lights will improve public safety and beautify our neighborhoods while reducing energy costs and improving our environment over the long term. This will be the first arterial street in Long Beach outfitted with LED lights, but stay tuned -- it won't be the last.

Finally, these next few months you will see us continue sidewalk repairs in all parts of the district, as well as street work, continuing the tremendous progress we've made over the past three years on repairing our previously neglected infrastructure. While we still have a lot to do, by increasing our infrastructure budget and being more efficient with your tax dollars (like reinstituting a street maintenance program), we've made headway to returning our streets and sidewalks to the condition our communities deserve.



## Springtime's Busy Bees

Spring has sprung! New leaves and flowers in our neighborhood say it is so! In spring, beehives grow by division and start to swarm. The reigning queen of an established hive departs with about half of the workers. While they search for a suitable spot to set up shop, they shelter in protected locations. They will typically move on within a few days.

A note about "Africanized" bees: Almost all feral colonies of honey bees in Southern California have some percentage of Africanized stock - some more than others. This accounts in no small part for the continued success and survival of colonies in the face of parasites and pesticides. It's not necessarily a cause for alarm. Incidents with Africanized honey bees almost always relate to a perception of threat to their hive. Their behavior in defense of home and honey is very different than their behavior when looking for a new home.

A few facts about bees and swarming: Bees are far more protective of the entrance to their hive than they are when foraging, and swarming bees remain surprisingly docile; they're exposed, and have everything to lose by getting into a fight.

Swarming bees, which generally look like a glob of bees in a tree, under an eave or in a backyard barbeque, are rarely cause for alarm. Still, avoid approaching them and forcing a confrontation.

If you encounter an established hive by surprise, do not approach it. Bees guard the hive's entrance, often with their lives. Move calmly away to lessen the likelihood of attack. If you find yourself the subject of a hive's wrath, run. An angry hive cannot generally travel as fast as a motivated human. Get inside or into a completely enclosed location. Taking refuge underwater is actually an incredibly dangerous gambit.

If you find a swarm or a new hive on your property, you need not destroy them. When outside your house, local bee groups can remove and relocate them. Contact Long Beach Beekeepers at LBBeeRescue@yahoogroups.com. They will help determine if the new hive can be relocated safely. If bees have already become tenants in your home, however, you will likely need a professional bee removal service. The weight and moisture of a hive can be very damaging to your home's structure. Simply killing or removing them may not solve the problem.

## An Indoor Cat is a Happy Cat!

So you think your cat can only be happy going outside? Do you rationalize that he's been going outdoors all his life and couldn't adjust to an indoor-only life? Cat welfare organizations assure us that as long as a cat's basic needs of food, water, shelter and stimulation are met in an indoor environment, they live contented lives. A cat kept indoors lives on average of 14-15 years or more. Of course, spaying/neutering and vaccinations are vital to this longevity.

A free-roaming cat encounters many dangers on a daily basis. Being hit by a car, killed by coyotes, subjected to animal cruelty by humans including deliberate trapping and poisoning are the worst part of the spectrum. But also fights with other cats and exposure to infectious diseases mean higher vet bills.

Turn your cat into a lover of the great indoors! Start by feeding ONLY inside the house. Instead of letting him back outdoors immediately, keep him inside for gradually longer periods of time. Be prepared with some attempts to escape by distraction with treats. Toss them away from the door. No cat can resist a little canned tuna or sardines (in water only please). Give the cat lots of positive attention with holding, petting, brushing, playtime and soothing talk. Treats with natural ingredients known to calm cats are available at pet stores. Use them especially at bedtime to reduce vocal protesting.


Once the cat is confined to the house, set out a scratching post and litterbox in a bathroom or bedroom where the cat can retreat to and feel safe. Cats love stimulation; rotate different toys for interest or bond with a kitty using a pole toy. Grow and set out cat grass - it will be a comforting reminder of the outdoors. Appeal to their inner scavenger by hiding treats behind closet doors, sofas or other places to make them "hunt."

Buy a cat condo for exercise. The ones with an enclosed portion for peeking out are popular with cats. Install a windowsill perch. Hang a bird feeder where kitty can see it from a window. If you feel kitty must have outdoor time, consider the more sturdy enclosures and cat runs. Some attach to the house and can be accessed from a window to the outdoors. Check online for many sources.

Remember this process takes patience. It took me about two weeks to adapt my cat to an indoor-only life. That was ten years ago. She is now a happy 14 year old with a safe, secure indoor habitat. For more information visit www.aspca.org/pet-care/cat-care.
