

president's message A MESSAGE FROM JOHN ROYCE

#### Why Old Places Matter

With all the time and effort that has gone into fourteen Home and Garden tours, I took particular notice of a blog I read on the National Trust for Historic Preservation website that focused on the question, "Why do old places matter?" Many historic city cores and even local "main streets" in older neighborhoods throughout the country benefit from the relatively recent rediscovery of community by those looking for stronger connections to the places they live, often finding it in older neighborhoods just like ours.

With suburban development of the post war era, vested interest became less important as people began to think of houses as places to rest their heads between long drives to work and regional shopping centers. Communities were replaced by gated or walled developments and neighborhoods became subdivisions, segregated by different builders, sharing little more than a strip mall or two and a massive collector road. One's sense of place became more difficult to define as a less intimate "home" stretched over increasing miles of interstate and super avenues. The fact that more people once again seek out places where they feel more connected, where history contributes to local culture and sense of place, offers hope for both the strength of our communities and appreciation for preservation efforts in the special places experiencing rediscovery.

The popularity of our Cal Heights Home and Garden tours and many other similar events indicates just such an appreciation, as guests imagine life amongst character rich homes and local shops, their sense of place and belonging hinting of the intangible bonds between a neighborhood and its inhabitants.

As we progress further into this Twenty-First Century, I sincerely hope that more of our current residents and those yet to arrive realize the fragility of this relationship and how easily it can be eroded when the historic fabric that defines it is allowed to whittle away via the forces of incremental destruction. Many neighborhoods, some nearby, offer glimpses of such unfortunate turning points. Unless homeowners understand their role as caretakers of our unique value and sense of place, we may eventually have neither.

Many thanks to those residents who've taken their homes' special considerations to heart, find pride in their preservation and restoration, and truly act as caretakers of history while embracing and enjoying their time within their walls. Without you, we would have no Home & Garden Tours, no community projects, and little reason to celebrate this special home we affectionately call Cal Heights.

We hope you enjoyed a happy Hanukkah and wish you a Merry Christmas and many happy and healthy New Years in our neighborhood and the charming homes we celebrate. \*



#### From the 7<sup>th</sup> District

James Johnson Councilmember

I am pleased to report that rating agency Fitch recently analyzed Long Beach's finances and was impressed enough that they upgraded our city's outlook from "negative" to "stable". In this report, Fitch specifically cited two of my initiatives, our revised financial policies and reserves set aside for known future challenges. Long Beach's strong financial rating is

directly responsible for recent refinancing deals that saved residents millions of dollars.

Long Beach's fiscal prudence comes at the same time we are pressing forward with several community improvements:

- Repavement of the Dana Branch Library parking lot, improving the library while savings thousands of dollars by efficiently consolidating the work with repairs being done on Atlantic
- Approval of \$300,000 for a new "Westside Plan" that will re-envision the western side of Long Beach
- Proceeding to the next round of a \$924,000 grant for improvements at Willow Springs Park
- And the pending reconstruction of Spring Street. We can improve our city now while leaving a better city for our kids.

Boeing may be considering alternative manufacturing sites for construction of its 777 jet. While this is Boeing's decision to make, the City Council went on record that we will do whatever we can to maximize our chances of bringing these jobs to LB.

Finally, this year we're celebrating the 60th Annual Daisy Parade. The applications have all been collected and it looks like we'll have almost 80 entries for this year's parade. The parade is 12/14 at 5pm, located on Daisy Avenue between Pacific Coast Highway and Burnett Street. We will have the community tent on 21st Street with flyers and information about things going on in the city, as well as hot chocolate (while as supplies last). The 5th Annual Wrigley Snow Day will be held on 12/28 at 11am at Veteran's Park. With the holiday season in full swing, it's a time for very busy schedules, celebration and shopping. We don't want you to be paranoid, but taking a few simple precautions will help to ensure a happy and healthy time for all.

#### When shopping:

- Park in well-lighted areas
- Keep car doors locked and windows closed
- Carry purses or bags close to your body
- Be aware of your surroundings and walk with confidence avoid ear buds and cell phone usage which can distract you from your environment
- Avoid shopping alone; there is safety in numbers
- Use credit and debit cards to avoid carrying large sums of
- Keep packages in the trunk or out of sight
- Have your car key ready before arriving at your car
- Report suspicious activity to on-site security or police
- Keep receipts and take photos of purchases

#### At home:

- Make your home look occupied use energy efficient lights on timers, leave a radio on and don't let ads and newspapers accumulate
- Let your Community Watch or trusted neighbors know when you travel
- $\mbox{\ }^{\bullet}$  Lock doors and windows unsecured entries are the most common entry points for burglars
- Keep windows covered to deter prying eyes
- Break down boxes to fit inside recycle bins to avoid advertising expensive items and don't place bins out until day of collection
- Never store gifts or leave purses or electronics in your car
- Consider a home security system

And always remember, if you see something suspicious, **REPORT IT** immediately by dialing 911 and be prepared to give as accurate descriptions as possible.


