Allow me to sidestep our Home and Garden Tour preparations for this issue's message to say a few words about an important group of folks in our community.

Moms are pretty special people. Every single one of us has one. While I realize that, sadly, not everyone has the fortune to know theirs, most of us do, and their efforts and contributions go largely unsung except for that day in May when Hallmark and Carlton benefit from the rest of the year's benign neglect. Whether they work outside the home or within it, moms' jobs are never ending. From family chauffeur to the dreaded science project rescue effort, relaxation is rare and "hectic" is the generally accepted term for the description of a mother's life. Yet the vast majority of them dutifully carry on, albeit with various levels of success and styles.

I was away last issue. I had suddenly lost my mom and was tending to those tasks that death casts upon us. Even though Mom was 91, I was not prepared for her departure. She was a happy contented soul who looked forward to each day. The fact that at 91 she met her end after she took her morning bath, brewed her coffee, cut and sectioned a grapefruit, retrieved the paper and was sitting down to do her daily crossword before Dad woke up says it all. My siblings and I had come to expect that Mom was going to be with us for some time to come. Expectations don't always pan out.

With eight kids, Mom was always busy and never bored. She worked hard, but never considered her chores work. She did them with pride and conviction and because she cared about all of us. Always up first, by the time the rest of us rose, she'd already taken her bath, was ready for work, had breakfast on the table and was running around to kiss us goodbye. She rarely complained or wanted for more, and even though she was busy, she allowed herself the distraction of a smile or a funny story. She never treated anyone badly because she was having a bad day. Mom welcomed and graciously accepted our friends and partners at her dinner table and in her home. Respect was never earned, it was granted and yours to lose, a philosophy I'm proud to have inherited.

We must someday say good-bye to our parents. We are so blessed to have had Mom around and healthy for so long, and that she suffered little as she left her cherished world of hugs and laughter. So in memory of my mom, thank you to all the moms in our community for all you contribute.



At Your Long Beach Public Library

The school year is back upon us! I seem to remember a book of Charlie Brown cartoons titled "Summers Fly, Winters Walk;" and it really doesn't matter if you are eight years old or 38, those summers just hurry right on by into fall! This year, how about celebrating fall and the new school year by getting a Long Beach Public Library card for everyone in the family?

The Dana Neighborhood Library (3680 Atlantic Avenue) offers a full array of programs, materials, and services. Did you know, for example, that the library has after school homework help Tuesday-Friday and all day on Saturdays for children in elementary, middle, and high school? The homework centers, or "Family Learning Centers", in all Long Beach libraries have computers for students to use for Internet searching and word processing and dedicated staff to assist students with homework assignments.

In addition to the standard library materials like our books, magazines, CDs, and DVDs, the Long Beach Public Library also offers nearly 50 subscription databases available only to library card holders (http://www.lbpl.org/databases/default.asp). These electronic services include everything from science to literature to history to current events for patrons in Kindergarten through college. Biography Resource is an excellent place to look for all those obscure historical names. General OneFile is a magazine database with literally millions of full-text articles that can be searched by keyword, author, publication title, subject, even year! Opposing Viewpoints, which is a database of essays, articles, websites, and media is another valuable resource for current social issues. Patrons can even watch animated picture books online or download audio and e-books from the databases. All that's needed is a Long Beach Public Library card for these databases and so many more!



Summer of Clean & Green!

Clean Streets and ReLeaf continue to make a difference in our community. For more than 100 weeks our Clean Streets volunteers have met each Thursday morning to pick up litter, pull weeds, remove graffiti and illegal signs and report areas of concern. We've removed over 1000 bags of litter from local business corridors and freeway access areas, trash that will never clog storm drains, wash out to the river and beaches, and won't mar the cityscape we share. Our volunteers were recently told that we could no longer clean the north side freeway on/off ramps at Atlantic and the Wardlow/Long Beach Blvd on ramp. We are in talks now with CalTrans to adopt those areas so we can enter legally and resume our efforts.

This summer as our volunteer pool increased, we combined our ReLeaf efforts for summer tree care along Atlantic, weeding and tree care at the Lot 33 (33rd/Atlantic) native garden, Uptown Farmer's Market trees and several other local project sites. ReLeaf received partnership commitments from the BKBIA and Hughes Green Team to purchase a 210 gallon pickup truck water tank to more easily water trees out of reach of water sources. CHNA's volunteer accountant, Trish Gergen and husband, Bob Gill, Los Cerritos neighborhood residents, generously offered to purchase a pump to reduce watering time, and Don & Harold's Automotive will install the pump at no charge.

Finally, for those residents near $35^{\rm th}$ & Lime Avenue, we hope you've noticed the improvement to the oil lot there. $7^{\rm th}$ District Council Office rep, Mary Sramek, attends most of our weekly cleanups and noticed the conditions of this area. Three weeks later the site's appearance had improved dramatically! We're hoping to see continued improvement in the future. We'll keep you posted. CHNA thanks all of our dedicated Clean Streets and ReLeaf volunteers! *





From the 7^{th} District

James Johnson Councilmember

Dear Friends,

Before taking office, I heard from many constitutions about the dilapidated condition of Wardlow Road. This is not only one of the worst streets in our district, it is one of the worst in the city. I heard your concerns loud and clear. After months of planning, I am proud to announce

that Wardlow Road will finally have its much-needed repair within the next several months. The street will be repaved from Cherry Avenue to the 405 Freeway, providing a more visually appealing, but more importantly, safe drive across our neighborhoods. I am also working with the Cal Heights Neighborhood Association to improve sight lines and allow for possible future tree planting and improvements to pedestrian access.

Another common neighborhood issue I heard before taking office was the need for a traffic light at the corner of 36th and Orange Avenue. Many residents talked about this intersection being unsafe for pedestrians and having difficulties turning onto Orange Avenue due to poor sight lines and high speeds. The traffic engineer has reported to me that, in his professional opinion, a traffic light will help slow down through traffic on Orange, thus improving safety for the neighborhood. We will begin installation of a new traffic light at this intersection in the coming months. Again, we are working with the CHNA to maintain the historic look of the area.

Finally, I'd like to welcome Fresh & Easy Neighborhood Market to the 7th District. Located on the corner of Atlantic Avenue and 33rd Street, this new store will provide a friendly and inviting entrance to the Cal Heights/Bixby neighborhoods. This is one of the first steps in reviving the southern end of Atlantic Ave (along with façade improvements at Dave's Burgers, which is underway now, and Alex's Automotive, which is nearing completion), unifying the Bixby Knolls business corridor. I will continue my efforts on Atlantic Avenue and there will be more to come.










New Life for our Wardlow Strip!

One of the most significant corridors for Cal Heights is Wardlow Road. Unfortunately, the infrastructure has seen better days. We've long held that its condition limits the viability of businesses there and causes a great many of our residents to steer clear of an area that holds promise as a walkable and attractive business district. It's one of the reasons our Clean Streets team pays so much attention to keeping it clean. The 7th District Council office diligently sought funding for this project and announced major rehabilitation to begin before the end of the year. While street trees were not in the proposed budget, the council office arranged a meeting with Public Works and CHNA. We have offered to work with Public Works to plan for trees where possible. Cal Heights ReLeaf will fund and organize the planting and care for the trees for five years until fully established. The most cost prohibitive part of a commercial zone planting is cutting the tree wells. Planning for them while curbs and sidewalks are being replaced means the cuts will not be needed. A green facelift for the asphalt laden cityscape and a more pedestrian friendly feel offers hope to entice resident shoppers and diners to the "Wardlow Strip!" *



Bike Saturdays & Safety Tips

As many heed encouragement to ditch our cars and head out on foot and bicycles to relieve congestion and air pollution, the need has grown to remind those new to or returning to cycling of the rules of the road. Grants and funding opportunities have graced our business corridors with hundreds of new bike racks to accommodate cyclists, and the Bike Long Beach participating businesses offer discounts and special offers for cyclists, like Bike Saturdays. Bicycles should never be ridden on sidewalks; cyclists should ride to the block they seek to visit, then walk their bikes to the nearest bike rack. The Dishwasher Blues (or Crusty Whites)

Have you been noticing your dishwasher isn't performing as well as it once did? You are not alone. Due to the banning of phosphates in dishwashing detergent (except for commercial use) in an additional 17 states this past year, most detergent manufacturers have eliminated phosphates altogether. This, coupled with the EPA mandated guidelines for water restrictions on dishwashers, has resulted in crusty white build-up in the dishwashers, not sot clean dishes and cloudy glassware. We hope that the manufacturers will be able to improve on the currently available products, but until then here is some helpful info to improve the performance of your dishwasher.

Consumer Reports has rated (out of 100 possible points) the following phosphate free products as the best available: Finish Quantum (tablets) 78 rating, Finish Powerball Tabs (tablets) 77 rating, Cascade Complete All In One Action Pacs (pacs) 74 rating. The highest rated powder was Cascade Complete All in 1 with a 53 rating. Previously, Cascade rated much higher in the "Excellent" category, but the changes have taken their toll.

In addition to using a recommended detergent, you should also do the following in order to protect the investment of your dishwasher and enhance its performance. Use a rinse aid for better drying-Jet Dry or similar. Depending on how hard your water is, you will need to clean/descale the unit every 4-8 weeks. You can use Jet Dry dishwasher cleaner, Lemi Shine cleaner or simply pour 1 cup of white vinegar in the bottom of an empty unit and run a regular cycle. You can also use a tooth brush soaked in white vinegar to clean the nozzles on spray arms and any lift-out filters you may have. Check your manual.

If you need to eliminate any scale on your glassware, you can run a regular cycle (or a delicate cycle, depending on the glassware) using ascorbic acid (vitamin C powder) instead of soap. This will also help on the hard water deposits in the machine. You can also add TSP to your dishwashing detergent-which is basically adding back in the phosphates, but this seems like a lot of trouble.

There are blogs that discuss this in detail, if you're interested. Keeping your dishwasher clean, rinsing your dishes as best you can and keeping on top of the cloudy glassware should help the situation.

In conclusion, before you run out and buy a new dishwasher, try these remedies. Most likely, the issue is with the detergent, not the machine.
