

New Cal Heights Mural

As the year wraps up, we want to take the opportunity to inform residents about one of the multiple projects CHNA has begun since the completion of the lamppost project. It has long been CHNA's mission to foster a sense of com-

munity and to that end we support the creation of community spaces. These are places that encourage pedestrian traffic in our neighborhood and provide points of interest that anchor the neighborhood.

We are proud to announce that CHNA is currently working on the creation of a mural located at the intersection of Orange Avenue and Bixby Road. The creation of this mural would complement a previously completed mural sponsored by CHNA at the intersection of Orange and Wardlow, providing a mural at both ends of a key thoroughfare bisecting the neighborhood. The mural is targeted for completion in early 2017.

For this project, we selected Long Beach artist Emily Tanaka, an artist and resident who has a history of contributing to local projects, such as the Wilmore Heritage Park, that re-envision historical spaces in Long Beach for the purpose of restoration and preservation. Due to the mural's proximity to the school, we wanted an artist who has created art for children as well. Emily has created the vision for a Children's Garden at Farmlot 59, created children's coloring books, all with a whimsical quality. She is active in the Long Beach arts scene, an organizer for MOLAA's annual Zinefest, and is inspired by this city's urban landscape from the coast line to its friendly, diverse neighborhoods.

As you can probably imagine, there are many costs involved with the installation of a mural. While CHNA is funding the majority of this project, we will require additional sources of funding to cover the gap. As such, we are asking residents to please consider donating to this project. By donating you would be supporting our efforts to provide community members with a public art space designed for residents and business patrons of all ages. As a thank you for your generosity, we would name all donors in a special thanks plaque that will be painted alongside the mural, and a in our newsletter when the project is complete. Your donation would be tax deductible. As the year end approaches, we know you have many choices of excellent projects to support, but we do hope you consider us. It is a rare opportunity to make a lasting contribution to the unique charm and character of our neighborhood.

Cal Heights Looking Back

On November 11th we celebrated Veterans Day. Did you have someone you thought of - a family member, a friend, maybe someone who gave their life to protect our freedom? These days we are all searching for a hero, someone to look up to, someone to make us proud. Here in Cal Heights we had such a hero, a man who acted with honor and made the ultimate sacrifice for our country,

Captain Billy E. Phelps.

Captain Phelps lived with his family on Gaviota Avenue. He was an aviator and served with the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II. During that time he flew 24 missions over Germany, was captured and imprisoned in Stalag Luft III, the camp made famous in the movie The Great Escape. Captain Phelps escaped the Nazis not once but twice during the forced march of hundreds of U.S. service men during the winter of 1945. After his final capture, his camp was liberated by the U.S. Third Army on April 19, 1945 at 11:58 am under the command of General Patton. He remembered the exact time. It took Captain Phelps a full year to recover from the devastating effects of imprisonment and malnutrition.

Captain Phelps along with 16 million Americans were heroes during that terrible conflict, but what sets him apart is that even after his horrific treatment in the camps he volunteered to fly needed supplies back into Germany during the Berlin Airlift. He piloted over 160 missions assisting the recovery of people who were once his enemy. On December 5, 1948 he was tragically killed when the C-54 he was piloting crashed. He was just 26 years old.

Although Captain Phelps died a long time ago we still have heroes among us. Look around at the teachers, firefighters, nurses and volunteers who work every day to make sure our American way of life continues. Tom Brokaw said that Captain Phelps belonged to the "Greatest Generation", but maybe we need to instill to our young people the attributes of heroes: dedication, sacrifice and compassion and so they, too, can become the greatest generation.



Bike Friendly Long Beach

On November 12th Long Beach had it's 3rd Beach Streets event, this time it was in midtown. Beach Streets is an open streets event designed to showcase businesses and neighborhoods. For a single day, the city closes a major traffic corridor to cars and opens the street to people walking, bicycling, roller-skating or skateboarding. The event attracts local residents and visitors from the entire city to explore and discover the area at a slower "foot-traffic" pace. Previous Beach Streets events have attracted more than 40,000 people.

If you missed Beach Streets and feel the urge to bike around the city, you can hop on a blue bike. In March of this year the city unveiled a new bike share program, which you may have noticed several blue bikes at various parts of the city.

When fully implemented, the bike share program will include 500 powder blue bicycles at 50 stations throughout Long Beach. You can easily check out bikes and find maps at longbeachbikeshare.com.

The 9th Annual Long Beach Bike Count took place on October 20th and 23rd. Volunteers counted cyclists and pedestrians at 36 locations across the city. This program is one of the longest-running bike counts in the country and has relied on volunteers for its success.

This is an important event because it gives city planners and engineers data to make informed decisions about the city's transportation network. Counts are conducted before and after new infrastructure projects are constructed to determine the effectiveness and popularity of specific types of bikeways. Bike count data are also used to supplement safety statistics and have enabled the city to engaged in targeted public safety campaigns.

Victorian Christmas at the Bembridge House

Many of you may not be aware of the Bembridge House, the first City Landmark, located at 953 Park Circle, adjacent to Drake Park in the Willmore Historic District. This beautiful Queen Anne Victorian was built in 1906 and boasts 18 rooms and a carriage house. Originally built for Josephine and Stephen Green, the home has had few alterations. Stephen Green, a founder of City National Bank, spared no expense in the construction and furnishing of the home. It is filled with original features including beautiful leaded glass windows, intricate wood moldings and paneling and original light fixtures. The Greens lived in the home until 1919 when it was purchased by the Rankin family. Dorothy Rankin Bembridge lived in the home her entire life. She passed away in 1999 and Long Beach Heritage purchased the home in 2000. Dorothy Bembridge was passionate about preservation in Long Beach and served as the first Chairperson of the Cultural Heritage Commission when it was formed. Long Beach Heritage has been restoring the home ever since.

Every year at this time, a bit of magic happens at the Bembridge House. Volunteers from for the City's various Historic Districts get together and decorate the house for the Victorian Christmas Celebration. Each room is decorated by a different group in the traditional Victorian Style. The home is opened for holiday tours beginning with the Victorian Christmas Celebration on December 4th. This is a special day with refreshments, crafts for the children in the carriage house, a visit from Santa and music provided by the South Coast Chorale Singers. The beautifully maintained gardens host the ever popular Garden Boutique. The time for this event is 11:00-3:00 pm. Tickets are \$10.00 each and children under 10 are free with a reservation. A new addition to the festivities this year is the Evening Victorian Christmas for adults only. It will be held December 9th from 6:00-8:00 pm. You can see the Bembridge House at night with all of the lovely decorations illuminated and enjoy the South Coast Chorale Singers and enjoy a cup of Holiday Wassail. Tickets for this event are also \$10.00 each. Tickets for either event or holiday season tours can be purchased online at www.LBHeritage.org.

The CHNA has participated in this event since its inception many years ago. Special thanks go out to John Royce and Kerrie Weaver for their dedication to this project over the years. If anyone is interested in volunteering for this project next year, please let us know. Also, contributions of Victorian or other vintage era decorations are always welcome. The Bembridge House is a hidden jewel in Long Beach and the holiday season is a wonderful time to experience it.





A Long Beach institution for a hearty breakfast to power a workday in the oil fields of Signal Hill is about to celebrate forty years of continual business on Wardlow Road here in California Heights. Babe's Kitchen, started by George Whitlock on November 8, 1976, serves home made pies, jams and bread along with classic farm table breakfast. It has been a regular spot to eat for those up and ready to go at 5:30 am.

On October of this year; new owners, (and Bixby Knolls residents) Beckie Cousens and husband Gabriel Flores took over the eatery and look forward to another forty years of local success. The staff has increased from George and his two longtime waitresses Jacki and Kris, to seven, and includes Ivan helming the cooking deck full time, with help behind the scenes from Beckie and Gabriel.

Long time favorites, like pork chops and eggs, biscuits and gravy and corn beef hash, are still on the menu along with new inspired daily specials, including bread pudding and a kale/spinach omelette which are announced on a giant chalkboard on the back wall. The homemade jams, thick cut grilled toast along with pies and cobbler are favorites with longtime patrons, as well as with newbies investigating this family run café for the first time. A fortieth celebration and retirement party for George will be happening sometime in mid-November. &
