We now effectively have until early July to educate ourselves on the proposal and its potential impacts and to make sure our opinions are heard and considered in this matter.



Cal Heights Looking Back

I f you grew up in the Long Beach area, you were probably familiar with Signal Hill when it was a very active oil field and not covered with nice houses and a park, as it is today. Back then we could practice driving, gaze at the view or even sneak a cuddle and kiss among the oil derricks, but did you ever race up it in a classic Model T Ford? From 1954 to 1976, the Long Beach Model T Club hosted the Signal Hill Climb, and as members, Jeff and Marsi Skinner saw their share of the action.

Jeff Skinner grew up in Long Beach and has always loved cars. In 1960 he married Marsi and they lived in Cal Heights, finally settling down on Falcon Ave in 1965, where they raised two children, Laura and Randy. Jeff continued to buy and restore all kinds of cars, eventually purchasing a Model T "in a trunk" - quite literally all the pieces of the car in the back of a truck. As Jeff lovingly restored the car in his garage, he was often joined by his neighbors who also enjoyed working on cars and boats, creating a community of gearheads up and down the alleyway.

Marsi fondly remembers the Long Beach Model T Club organizing monthly trips when the whole family would hop in the Model T, picnic baskets in tow, and head out together to great places like Rancho Los Amigos, the old Helms Bakery and local parks. One of the highlights of the year was attending and participating in the Model T Hill Climb up what was then known as Shell Hill. Crowds would gather along Hill and Obispo Streets to watch various types of Model T's "race" up the hill one by one to win trophies and bragging rights for the next year. The Skinners even placed in a few races in their "stock fordors" division. You can imagine the roar of the crowd and the thrill of watching as the classic cars mostly made it to the top. Some actually had to turn 180 degrees halfway up and then back up the hill to keeps the gas flowing on that very steep incline.



The Skinners still drive that beautiful Model T painted a classic British Racing Green, and they often display it during the Cal

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Heights Home tour. Be sure to keep a look out for it parked on the street - unfortunately, no longer "racing" up the hill. 🖘









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Letter from Development Services

By now, most residents have received a letter from Long Beach Development Services regarding historic properties. This correspondence is a reminder to all residents that California Heights is a Historic District and, as such, is subject to specific regulations. 7200 residents of all Historic Districts in the city have been sent this letter. For longtime residents, this is nothing new. It has just been a few years since the City has sent them out. The letters will be an annual mailing from this point on.

California Heights has benefited from the protections of Historic District designation, and it is the responsibility of residents to follow the guidelines of both the Secretary of Interior Standards and the California Heights Historic District Ordinance. More information on these guidelines can be found at www.lbds.info or at www.calheights.org.

A Certificate of Appropriateness is required for any exterior modification to a property, including paint colors, fences, hardscape or any other change to exterior finish materials. Failure to obtain the required Certificate of Appropriateness and a building permit, when necessary, can result in fines and other penalties, as noted in the LB Municipal Code. These guidelines help to preserve the character and architectural integrity of the homes in our neighborhood and maintain the charm of our streetscape. Since becoming a Historic District in 1990, California Heights has become an even more desirable area to live. The pride of ownership residents have, coupled with the adherence to the guidelines, has resulted in a beautifully maintained historic neighborhood and an increase in property values for all residents.

Following the guidelines is not as onerous as you might think. City staff is available to review and assist you with your project. Many things can be approved over the counter, such as paint colors and fences. Larger projects require review by the Cultural Heritage Commission. Staff can guide you on what is appropriate to your specific project and clarify the various guidelines. It is wise to have a preliminary meeting with Staff before incurring any fees from architects. It is much better to get the necessary approvals and permits rather than using inappropriate materials or designs and having to replace them at your expense, in addition to the fines.

It is up to all residents to work together to maintain this great neighborhood, and following the regulations of our Historic District is a key part.

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Mills Act Update

t the January 6, 2015 City Council meeting, the Council voted to reinstate the Mills Act Property Tax Incentive Program for historic properties. The program was suspended in 2006, and residents have been patiently waiting for applications to again be accepted.

Entering into a Mills Act contract results in a property tax reassessment by the local county tax assessor, who assesses the property value by applying a complicated formula based on income capitalization, risk factors and expected life of the property. This new assessment generally results in an approximate 30-50% reduction in property taxes. The contract runs with the property and is passed onto subsequent owners. The contract is for a period of 10 years and automatically renews itself on a continuous basis unless the City takes steps to cancel the contract. Once the contract is cancelled, the actual termination date of the contract is 10 years from the date of cancellation.

Previously, contributing houses in Historic Districts were eligible to apply for a Mills Act contract. This is no longer the case with the reinstatement. All buildings who apply for a Mills Act contract must be listed as a local historic landmark. Typically, it is recommended that properties considered for a Mills Act contract have a high level of architectural integrity and significance and be in need of restoration that results in enhancing the architectural heritage of the entire community. The resulting public benefit helps to offset the reduced property tax revenue the City would receive. Currently, there are 113 designated local historic landmarks that would be eligible to apply for Mills Act contracts. At this point in time, Staff is recommending that a limited number of applications be accepted annually for the next five years. The recommendation is 12 single-family homes, 3 duplex or triplex, 1 multi-family building (4 or more units) and 1 non-residential building. In 2019, the program will be evaluated to assess the property tax reduction and overall effectiveness.

Currently, the fees have not yet been finalized. At the urging of Historic District residents and those in the preservation community, Staff is working on a combination fee for the landmark process and the Mills Act application, since much of the work is redundant.








Rethinking Single-Use

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Matching Gift Program

Does your employer offer a Matching Gift Program? The California Heights Neighborhood Association is a non-profit 501(c)(3) and eligible to receive funds from many sources, including the matching gift programs offered to employees of some companies. For example, if you write a check to CHNA for \$100, your company would issue CHNA a check for either the same (\$100) or twice (\$200) the amount.

In some cases, volunteer hours are matched. Monetary donations are offered as a match for an employee's volunteer work. Some examples in this case include companies donating a set dollar amount per hour of volunteering completed on an employee's own time or a certain amount after 20 to 50 hours of completed volunteer work.

Matching gift programs generally consist of five steps:1. Individuals donate;2. Nonprofits notify eligible donors;3. Donors submit matching gift requests;4. Nonprofits validate grant requests; and5. Corporations cut checks.

If your employer offers a Matching Gift Program, please consider donating to the California Heights Neighborhood Association. This provides a major source of fundraising for non-profit organizations. 🖘



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IN THE KNOW'LLS What's New? What's Happening?

Beach Streets

I wanted to give you a heads-up on "the next big thing" coming through our area. On Saturday, June 6, "Beach Streets" will be rolling along Atlantic Avenue between Wardlow (south end) and Harding (north end). Atlantic will be closed to automobile traffic and available to the public to walk, skate, ride, or even scooter from one end to the other.

The city won a grant from L.A. Metro to hold its own "ciclovia" or "open streets" event similar to what has been happening in Los Angeles, the Valley, and even Garden Grove.

What is it?

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"Ciclovía (also ciclovia or cyclovia), is a Spanish term that means "cycleway," either a permanent bike path or the closing of certain streets to automobiles for cyclists and pedestrians, a practice sometimes called open streets. The inspiration for Ciclovías is credited to Bogotá, Colombia. Each Sunday and public holiday from 7 am until 2 pm, certain main streets of Bogotá, Cali, Medellín, and other municipalities are blocked off to cars for runners, skaters, and bicyclists. At the same time, stages are set up in city parks. Aerobics instructors, yoga teachers and musicians lead people through various performances. Bogotá's weekly ciclovías are used by approximately 2 million people (about 30% of the population) on over 75 miles of car-free streets

In that spirit, Atlantic Avenue will be activated with music, farm stands, extended patios at the restaurants, classes, games and art activities, and a music festival in Houghton Park. Council office 7, 8, and 9 are working closely with the BKBIA, Uptown PBID, Public Works, Special Events, and Bikeable Communities to make this a spectacular event for the area.

More information will be provided to the business owners and residents very soon, and I'm sure you will see it all over Facebook and email blasts.

In Other News:

Deep Blue Swim School has begun its build-out and looks to open by the end of May. This will be a great spot in the neighborhood for swim lessons and water safety for kids. Not a strong swimmer? There will be adult swim lessons, too. We welcome them to Bixby Knolls.

By the time you are enjoying this newsletter, we will have had two more scouts from Troop 29 complete their Eagle Projects in the district. **Nolan Van Wyk's** project was to transform the empty parkway on Bixby Road (west of Atlantic) into a manicured landscape with drought-tolerant plants, boulders, and small trees. **Dietrich Hensen's** project is the first of the façade improvement for the Expo Arts Center. Dietrich will be painting the setback sidewalk of the building with an artistic pattern to help the Expo Arts Center become THE iconic building in the neighborhood. Dietrich will also install new attractive landscape at the building's entrance.

Be on the lookout soon for the two new "art alleys" in Bixby Knolls. We are working with the property owners of Red Wing Shoes and EJ Malloy's to take the alley space and transform it with artwork. We will first install 4 metal frames on the south wall and have local artists install 4'x8' plywood paintings to be on display. On the north wall, local artists will paint murals to jazz up that side. Overhead we will remove the floodlights and replace them with attractive LED festoon lighting to create a more festive environment. On First Fridays we can shut down the alley and use it as an attractive event space with music, farm stands, or seating for EJ's. We also plan on installing custom painted pieces in the window/frames along the alley side of Healthway Foods on Bixby Road, west of Atlantic. The district will become more and more attractive when all of these streetscape projects come to fruition.
