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2021 California Heights Home & Garden Tour - Reimagined

It's that time again, the January issue of the Cal Heights newsletter always features a Home & Garden Tour article in a tour year. This year is no different, although the 2021 tour will look different from years past.

The Cal Heights Home & Garden Tour has been ongoing since the first tour in 1997. It is the association's major fundraiser and monies raised have helped finance the lamppost restoration project, two neighborhood murals, Clean Streets, Cal Heights Re-leaf, our newsletter, alley clean-ups, and block parties.

The tour has become a touchstone for our neighborhood. It is the longest running tour in any historic district city-wide and it is an opportunity for residents to come out and admire our beautiful homes, meet neighbors, and support a fundraiser that improves our neighborhood.

The CHNA Board has been discussing different options for the 2021 tour. It will most likely be some sort of virtual tour. Due to the pandemic, we need to keep everyone safe and healthy as best we can. The first priority is finding homeowners who are willing to have their home on a virtual tour. If you were to offer your home, you would have a maximum of two people in your home for the photos/video and information gathering for no more than two hours. Anyone involved would be following all of the safety protocols including wearing a mask and staying six feet apart.

We have been researching other neighborhoods that have had virtual tours to see what direction might work for Cal Heights. Any feedback from residents would be greatly appreciated. For any residents with experience in this type of presentation, this is a great opportunity for you to volunteer your talents.

Ideas that have been suggested include a walking tour app (home exteriors only) with information on the neighborhood history, architectural style of the home, etc. or an interior video of architectural highlights of a home with some historic background provided. We can also do interviews with homeowners about their home or their restoration projects. We have a lot of possibilities, but the first things we need are homes to feature.

We do not want to lose our momentum on the Cal Heights Home & Garden Tour by skipping a year and frankly, we need a fundraising mechanism of some kind to keep things running smoothly. This could be a minimal fee for the virtual tour or a no charge tour which will require us requesting donations from residents and formulating advertising opportunities for a nominal fee from people who want to advertise in the virtual Home Tour program. **We are asking Cal Heights residents to let us know what you would like to see in the 2021 tour and what suggestions you might have for making it a success. My hope is that people may be more comfortable opening their homes virtually than they would be to opening their homes to large numbers of IRL visitors. 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Let's Talk Trash

I don't know about you, but I've noticed a trend: Trash on curbs and in alleys and parkways. Maybe people are clearing space for home offices; maybe they're pitching whatever fails to spark joy. Whatever the reason folks are dumping junk where it doesn't belong. It's a hazard and an eyesore. More importantly, it's a code violation.

The City provides each City-service refuse account with two trash "carts": a gray cart for regular household trash and yard debris, and a purple one for recyclables. Anything too large or too bulky to fit inside a cart should never be left in an alley or at curbside, because our refuse collectors won't pick it up. Instead, consider these options for your unwanted items:

- If they can be reused by someone else, donate them to a resale organization or thrift store;
- Give them a new lease on life by offering them up on the Cal Heights Trading Post Facebook page;
- Put an ad on Freecycle.org, a free website that facilitates giving away unwanted items to neighboring households;
- Use one of the four Special Collections the City provides to each City-service refuse account per calendar year at no additional cost. To request a Special Collection, call the Refuse Hotline at (562) 570-2876, or request one online.

If you see illegally abandoned junk, it's easy to report it with the free GoLongBeach app. Simply open the app, scroll down to select "Trash, Debris & Dumped Items," and then follow the prompts. Snap a pic and/or add comments, if you like, then hit "Submit." You can monitor the status of your issue on the app, or just watch the junk disappear in the next couple of business days. Easy-peasy.

One more thing: COVID-permitting, our Cal Heights Clean Streets volunteers are out every Thursday from 8 a.m. to about 10 a.m. helping keep Cal Heights beautiful by picking up trash. To join in, check the CHNA Facebook page for updates, then just meet up on the north side of Wardlow Road at Lime Avenue. Thanks in advance, neighbor!

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Globemaster Corridor Specific Plan Moves Forward

On December 17, 2020, the City of Long Beach Planning Commission recommended approval of the Globemaster Corridor Specific Plan to the City of Long Beach City Council. This Specific Plan provides future guidance and regulations for properties along Cherry Avenue from Carson Street to Spring Street and along Spring Street from California Avenue to Lakewood Boulevard. According to the document, this Specific Plan "will be a twenty-first century employment district that becomes a destination for leading-edge firms to leverage its local, regional and global transportation connections and amenities in the center of Long Beach." The cornerstone of this Specific Plan is to convert the former Boeing C-17 plant into its next life – sometime similar to Douglas Park on the opposite end of Long Beach Airport. This Specific Plan will next be reviewed by the Los Angeles County Airport Land Use Commission since it includes airport-owned property. Once that body has completed their review, it will go to its last public hearing before the City Council. This hearing would likely happen late spring/early summer. Having tracked this Specific Plan grow from initial conception to where it is today, CHNA is happy with its overall progression. The plan creates jobs, beautifies Cherry Avenue, protects historic resources, and improves mobility and accessibility for all. With all plans, there may be opportunity for additional improvements to ensure that unintended spillover effects do not impact our neighborhood. In the coming weeks, please look for some information where we will be reaching out for your input. 🗣️


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Thursdays: 8:00 am at the corner of Lime and Wardlow. Masks are required and social distancing is practiced.
