# The Disaster Preparedness Plan in Cal Heights

Last year KPCC produced and released a podcast named The Big One. It was engaging and informative – and it presented the concept of disaster preparedness in a 'you are there' style that walked you through what you would need to know by having you imagine yourself facing the challenges that would develop after 'The Big One' hits California. Much of it was specific to the aftermath of a major earthquake, but much of it was more general. It even dug into the difficult psychology of preparing for (potential) future events.

The podcast left enough of an impression on me that I decided to take concrete steps to increase my family's readiness for that kind of a crisis. Go bags for the cars were purchased and a first aid kit that seemed more like an Urgent Care Clinic in a back-pack now lives in the house. This issue even followed me to a California Heights Neighborhood Association meeting when we began to discuss preparedness as it applies to a group or entire neighborhood. Ideas came and went. Some were good, some even practical but nothing really grabbed us as a viable project for the CHNA to undertake. Our first or second meeting of this year, though, was different. Board Member, Karen Highberger shared material that she remembered from a recent Long Beach City government presentation. At its essence, the City's guidance on disaster preparedness was really similar to the old Neighborhood Watch system that many of us may remember. Individual family units organize at the block level, with each block having one or more captains to organize locally, as well as to provide connection points to the other blocks or streets nearby.

That sounded like something we could do, and we reached out to folks at the City, hoping that we could arrange for a presentation or training session in our neighborhood. I kid you not, this was at most a couple of days before California announced the Safer at Home order. For me, that stay at home order was galvanizing. Mark, Kurt, and I were in good shape, and in a very good situation. (cont'd on page 3)

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(cont'd from front page) Even with that I was confused and worried, and occasionally fully scared. I knew we were not going to have much luck waiting on guidance from the City, now, as it was pretty obvious that City was going to have its hands full for the foreseeable future.

As soon as the stay-at-home order was announced, I decided that, ready or not, it was time to get something set up in our neighborhood. I was not the only person, and the CHNA was not the only group in the city with something like that in mind, and after some discussions with several of them, I decided to press forward in the way that felt natural and seemed to be the best suited to our neighborhood.

Thus was born the CHNA Emergency Preparedness Program. Our goal is to try to identify two captains for every block in California Heights. This means that each captain would be coordinating with fifteen to twenty neighbors – something on the order of one side of the street of each block. That's the end point we're working towards. For starters, one person per block or even per few blocks is better than no people per block. I would guess we're at about 75% coverage of the neighborhood overall, with only a few streets on the east side completely without coordination at this point, and several streets throughout with partial or minimal coverage.

I wanted to share a bit of the history of this effort if only to explain why we started it, and how we got to where we are today. I've been amazed and touched by the responses we have received so far – even with somewhat fuzzy goals. Right now, my only real goal is to grow this to the point where anyone who may be having any kind of trouble can be seen, and heard, and put in touch with neighbors who are willing to help. Social distancing does not have to mean social isolation. If we come out of the current crisis knowing each other better, and better able to rely on each other for help and support, then something demonstrably good will have come out of this. And if that mutual support leads to a more tightly knit community, working together to be even better prepared for whatever comes in the future, then all the better.






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# Cal Heights Looking Back

# California Heights Clean Streets Receives Volunteer of The Year Award

The California Heights Clean Streets Team recently received a Volunteer of the Year award from CalTrans for its work as part of Adopt-A-Highway. Under normal circumstances, this award would be presented at a dinner celebrating California's volunteers, but due to Covid-19, we were informed via email. The team covers the stretch of the 405 North that runs through our area. Clean Streets' Adopt-A-Highway duties consist of picking up trash from the on- and off-ramps on Atlantic Ave. and Long Beach Blvd., as well as on the feeder lane embankments connecting those two ramps. The team trains with CalTrans to do this work, and is one of the few groups in the state that actually clean the road themselves.

Our volunteers meet every Thursday morning, though our work has been suspended by the State of California due to the pandemic. Clean Streets recruits from our neighborhood, but also welcomes those who live outside of California Heights looking for an active way to serve the community and environment. Roberto Uranga's 7th District Council Office offers hands-on support, with staff members helping out and with addressing larger issues identified during regular cleanups. Clean Streets also coordinates with other teams, like Wrigley Clean Team and Bixby Knolls/Los Cerritos Clean Streets to keep the 7th sparkling.





# Free COVID-19 Testing

Diagnostic testing in Long Beach is available for anyone with symptoms of COVID-19. Certain locations are also testing essential workers who may have been exposed but are not showing symptoms.

Same or next day appointments can be made online and are prioritized for those 65 years or older; individuals with underlying chronic health conditions; and first responders, critical government workers, grocery workers, and health care professionals. Most test results will be processed in 7-10 days.

Dear Neighbors,

Thank you for your commitment to our Long Beach. As a City, we have made significant steps to protect ourselves during the COVID-19 pandemic. On April 28th, Governor Newsom outlined four stages for reopening our

economy. Long Beach has been in the first stage for the last few weeks. During this stage, we have seen our hospitalization and ICU trends stabilize, increased hospital surge capacity, increased our supply of personal protective equipment (PPE) and increased our testing capacity to meet demand by setting up six testing locations. In partnership with hospitals and private labs, 12,500 tests have been completed.

This work has enabled us to track below Los Angeles County for both positive cases and deaths per capita. We have made steps to flatten the curve and we are seeing a decrease in the number of new COVID-19 cases per day. We have met the benchmarks in Stage 1 and are now ready to transition to Stage 2. Please know that we are listening to scientists and closely monitoring the data to guide our decisions throughout this process.


As of Friday, May 8th, the City of Long Beach is now allowing retail businesses to reopen for curbside pickup and delivery services only. In addition, trails and their associated parking lots will reopen, golf courses may reopen, and car dealership showrooms may reopen. In all cases, the City's safety requirements, including social distancing and proper sanitization, must be adhered to.

While we continue to combat this pandemic, I want to urge Seventh District residents to continue to obey the "Safer at Home" health order and practice social distancing. When you are at home, practice good hygiene by washing your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and regularly disinfect frequently touched surfaces.




