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City Makes Big Changes to Recycling Program

The City of Long Beach has made sweeping changes to its curbside recycling program that will significantly limit the types of items residents can throw in their purple recycling bins. As of right now, the program will no longer accept plastic items including milk cartons, produce bags, squeezable condiment bottles, and most takeout containers, along with any other plastics labeled with the recycling codes 3, 4, 6, or 7.

"The City updated the accepted-items list earlier this year, and is now rolling out an education campaign to notify and educate the public about those updates," said Carmen Quezada, recycling specialist with the City of Long Beach. According to Quezada, the City had initially planned a number of live community outreach events to bring awareness to the new changes, but those had to be postponed because of the COVID-19 pandemic. In their place, Quezada said, the City created a more virtual campaign that will include social-media messaging, virtual workshops, and more.

It's not that Long Beach doesn't want these now non-conforming items to be recycled. It does. But a number of situations have made doing so challenging. First, few items labeled with recycling codes are actually recycled. In fact, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, only about 9 percent of plastics are. Second, China now bans most paper and plastic imports, including our trash. Prior to the 2018 ban, California sent about 60 percent of its recyclables to China. But the ban has left the state with a recycling industry in crisis and trash with nowhere to go. What's more, Quezada said, many recycling facilities are relatively specialized and process some recyclable items, but not others. That makes finding new markets to accept the City's recyclable waste a difficult task.


Purple bin or gray bin?

Generally speaking, plastics labeled with recycling codes 1 and 2 - like soda and water bottles, shampoo containers, milk jugs, and detergent bottles - should go in purple recycling bins. Thinner plastics labeled 3 through 7- like plastic bags and bubble wrap, clamshell containers, yogurt cups, foam packaging, and squeezable condiment bottles - should go in a gray bin. "Mixed-paper" items - meaning those made with paper lined in plastic - such as cereal boxes, milk cartons, to-go cups, soup cartons, and juice boxes, should be pitched in a gray bin. Corrugated cardboard, newspaper, printer paper, cardboard tubes from toilet paper and paper towels, and aluminum cans go in a purple bin. Glass bottles and jars, which are recycled domestically, continue to go in a purple bin. Anything that goes in a purple recycling bin should be empty, clean, and dry.

How to learn more

The City's website features easy-to-navigate information about its new curbside recycling updates in the Long Beach Recycles section. There, residents can register for virtual workshops - both in English and in Spanish - designed to help them "recycle right." The City has also created an Instagram account, link below, dedicated to providing recycling-program updates. (Links to all of the above will be provided on the CHNA Facebook page.) And residents will soon see new labeling on purple bins and informational billboards and decals on both refuse and recycling trucks. (cont'd page 3)

Whether these new changes to Long Beach's curbside recycling program will remain static is hard to say. The City intends to pursue new markets to accept our recyclable discards, and, if a suitable candidate comes through, the City may tweak its recycling program to accept additional items. For now, Long Beach will keep residents updated through the various methods described above.

See you again soon, and keep in touch.



The City of Long Beach is working diligently to bring awareness to the importance of participating in the 2020 Census. Your response is important as it helps to direct billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities for schools, roads, and other public services. Last month, my team participated in a canvassing event focused

in the Seventh District community. Currently, the Seventh District has a 69.4% self-reporting rate. This is encouraging but we must be sure our family, friends, and neighbors participate in the Census before the deadline on September 30th, 2020. Census responses can be submitted safely, securely, and easily by visiting https://my2020census.gov/.

During the general election, all registered voters will be mailed a vote by mail ballot to ensure they have safe access to voting option during the COVID-19 pandemic. Sixteen drop box locations, all available 24 hours per day, seven days per week, will be distributed throughout Long Beach. Completed ballots can be returned by mail (no postage required) or in-person at any Vote Center. Vote by Mail drop box locations will be available beginning October 5th and will close at 8 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, November 3. For a current list of LA County 24-Hour Vote by Mail drop boxes, to check your registration information or request a ballot in a different language, visit lavote. net. 

With regards to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are getting better at wearing our face coverings and making better decisions about who we see and how we distance around other people. This has led to a decline in positivity rates, which is at 4.6%, as of September 3rd. We are making progress, but the COVID-19 pandemic is not behind us. Long Beach, like 87 percent of the State, is in the Purple Tier, which is the most restrictive of the tiers announced by the State. Please continue to exercise caution: practice social distancing, use a face covering when in public, frequently wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and stay home when possible. 

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

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






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What's New? What's Happening? by Blair Cohn, Executive Director BKBIA


