Mayor Garcia's State of the City

On Tuesday, January 8, 2018 Mayor Robert Garcia delivered his fourth State of the City address Some of the achievements he discussed included:

- Millions of dollars in "critical" infrastructure and public safety investments under Measure A, a temporary sales tax increase approved by voters in 2016;
- 7.9 percent reduction in overall crime, including homicide and theft, as well as the lowest homicide rate recorded in 50 years;
- 2.3 percent reduction in the poverty rate from 2014 to 2016, or about 10,000 fewer Long Beach residents whose wages fall under the federal poverty line
- 4.4 percent unemployment rate in 2017 (a record low), similar to trends seen in major cities across California and the nation;
- Adoption of the Clean Air Action Plan, a joint agreement between the Long Beach and Los Angeles ports to achieve a zero emissions port complex by 2035;
- Long Beach Police Department began patrolling the problematic Blue Line stations.

When I graduated from nursing school in 1977 my instructors told me I had a career that would last forever, my future would be secure. "Think about the future" they always said, but what if your job really didn't have a future and only dealt with the past?


Mike Miner has a job that seems to have no future; he has no new clients, no prospect for sales and no one who really wants to take over his job. You see there is no future in it; you might even say it is a dead-end-job. Mike is the manager of the Sunnyside Cemetery where all the plots are sold and most of the clientele long ago buried. The cemetery began in 1906 and is the final resting place of more than 16,000 people from backgrounds as varied as Union soldiers, a Long Beach mayor and school teachers.

Mike was born at Long Beach Community Hospital, attended local schools, had a short stint in the Air Force and found his career in the electrical business, both as a salesman and in management. Many years later he became interested in the cemetery because his parents were buried there. He joined a non-profit group, "Friends of Sunnyside", where he became a board member and finally manager. The group hoped to operate the cemetery and make it a pleasant place where family members would visit and pay respects to their loved ones.

Sunnyside had a difficult past, a previous owner who absconded with a half million dollars of the endowment, staggering water bills, a dwindling revenue stream and general neglect. It doesn't help that is sits next to the Municipal Cemetery, which is often green while Sunnyside remains brown and barren.

So what does one do with a cemetery that no one seems to want? The answer for now is, get creative! The Historical Society of Long Beach stages an annual Halloween event where costumed actors re-create the lives of the people buried there. How about seeing a scary movie in the cemetery, they do that too. You can bring your blanket and commune with the permanent residents while watching cult favorites. They organize cleanup days, are on Facebook, and even have a Go Fund Me page.

Mike would like to retire, travel and see some of the world. He hopes the city of Long Beach will assume stewardship of Sunnyside but until then he and a dedicated group of volunteers will look towards the future and honor the past. 🖘





Welcome to a New Year! I am excited for this year and ready to continue working with each one of you to improve the 7th! I would like to share with you the improvements we've made benefitting the 7th District from July 2014 to present:

- 31 street blocks were paved/slurry sealed. 3.46 center line miles of streets were paved and 3.48 center line miles of streets were slurry sealed
- 9,589 street and alley potholes were repaired
- 6,421 trees were trimmed and 701 new trees were planted
- 20,042 graffiti sites were abated and 181 removals of graffiti from traffic signs
- 1,192 sidewalks were patched/repaired and sidewalks at 138 blocks of streets were replaced
- 886 traffic signs were repaired and 71 street markings were repainted
- 586 street sweeper signs were replaced
- 145 ADA ramps were installed
- Admiral Kidd Artificial Turf Field, field lighting, landscape and irrigation was just completed
- Dana Branch Library improvements will be done this month: lighting, rest room and circulation desk improvements for enhanced service. They are also looking into the possibility of installing hearing loops in the community room for the hearing impaired.
- Cherry Park playground also went through improvements and is currently under repair of the aging irrigation system.


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IN THE KNOW'LLS What's New? What's Happening?

A Decade of Positivity

December 17th marked my ten years at the BKBIA. Technically I hit the ground running (or strolling) after January 1, 2008, but I have spent the last month or so thinking back on ten years. To say it's gone by fast is a cliché (but true). To say it's gone by "full" is a better statement.

Working out of our old dusty, patched-together office at 4313 Atlantic was ground zero for kick-starting some new energy into the district. Over the last decade we have tried anything and everything to raise the profile of Bixby Knolls citywide and beyond (and that's what it's taken.) Early efforts included:

- Community parties at the Petroleum Club
- Window activation program included putting posters or artwork in windows so the buildings didn't look abandoned
- Tree plantings and cleanup days
- Monthly events to activate the neighborhood
- Bixby Business Breakfasts for BKBIA members
- Concerts in the Park(ing lot)
- Cash mobs and flash events

When I came on board First Fridays was in its infancy and it has been incredible to watch its growth over the last decade. We used to run out and tie balloons at the participating businesses so people would know where to go. If we got 20 people coming through our office we considered it a success.

We secured a ten-year contract with the city (for redevelopment funds) for streetscape work to make the area more attractive. The "Bixby Knolls Next 2 Exits" signs on the 405 freeway are from our RDA money.

RDA also funds:

- Private security company (CSI Patrol Service here in BK) for district patrols
- Installing security lights
- Clean Team litter abatement
- Façade improvements (paint and signage)
- Landscape projects
- Murals and utility boxes and our art alley (the "Allery") at Burlinghall and Atlantic

I am very proud of the longevity of Strollers, Literary Society, Supper Club, and Good Spirits Club which have created many friendships, connections, and collaborations. And our monthly Kidical Mass bike ride was only going to be a one-time event to be a part of the "bike friendly city" but is another monthly favorite event.

We worked with the 8th District Council Office to save the Expo Furniture building from being knocked down and a white fence installed around the property. The building has become a community center for children's theater, seniors activities, regular arts and culture events, and new home to our office and the 8th District Council's Field Office.

Energy begets energy and by doing as much as we could we caught the attention of the city. The more we did the more help and resources we received. I believe we are better off than ten years ago. Vacancies are low, more retail and restaurants have opened, and new businesses are moving in or getting make-overs.

The arrival of Steelcraft has definitely helped usher us into the new era. And we may soon be known as "Brewery Knolls." We've seen some of the last remaining icons close up and retire but have also seen the influx of new businesses and development. And there is plenty more on the near horizon.

I'm sure you are in love with Bixby Knolls as much as I am and please rest assured that the BKBIA is working hard every day so the district can reach its full potential and remain, as we say, the best neighborhood in the whole city!
