Redistricting Comes to Cal Heights

You are witnessing history. On November 18, Long Beach's Independent Redistricting Commission approved a Final Map establishing new City Council district boundaries throughout the city, a first for this new Commission!

Redistricting occurs every 10 years, following each census. It is the process of redrawing district boundaries to ensure equal voter representation, and occurs at the federal, state, and local level.

At the local level, Long Beach residents voted in 2018 to establish a commission of independent citizens from each Council district to redraw the City Council boundaries, ensuring independence from the Mayor and City Council, which previously drew the boundaries.

California Heights will no longer reside in a westside Council district, instead joining a Council district that stretches east from California Heights to the western border of El Dorado Park. This district also includes Bixby Knolls, the Long Beach Airport, and Long Beach City College.

Some of the earlier draft maps split Cal Heights into two Council districts or made it an island adjacent to the airport. Our neighborhood association advocated to "keep Cal Heights whole" and also supported efforts to join with Bixby Knolls – Cal Heights and Bixby Knolls have not been in the same Council district for at least 50 years, until now.

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President's Message

2021 appears to be wrapping up. I would have said 'winding down', but that just doesn't feel right somehow. A brief update on that topic for those of you who may have missed it, but Long Beach revises its council district borders every ten years when new census data becomes available. By the time you are reading this, it will likely be over, but from my vantage point on November 10th, it looks like California Heights will not suffer some of the indignities that some of our sister neighborhoods did in the last go round. This time, it's baked into their charter that they prioritize keeping Neighborhoods whole (unlike what happened to Los Cerritos ten years ago), and then work to keep communities of interest as whole as it is feasible to do. Those goals are constrained by some specific requirements about allowable variation in population between the new districts, and the real devil is in the details of defining a community of interest. Then, if you settle on a definition, you get to try to see which communities' priorities will be given precedence. It is a particularly technical kind of sausage we've been watching be made, and at the end of the day, I think the commission is going to have just about everyone some degree of upset with them. I think they are legitimately doing the best they can within the parameters they've been given.

Fellow board member, and fellow Cal Heights resident Manny Valenzuela has really been our envoy to this process, and he has remained involved from the start and honestly been instrumental in lighting the signal fires when we needed more active involvement. Thank you, Manny.

Looking back over this year, I am at a loss to think of things we have accomplished. But you know what? We're here. And we're moving forward. I know things aren't quite to the point where it's time to try to resurrect caroling, or the block party potlucks, but we had Halloween and it was awesome. The board and its members, like a grumpy bear, tend to hibernate over December and January. Come February, though, we'll be getting back to business. 

Cal Heights Looking Back

Did you ever dream of having it all? Wealth, prestige and even a chauffeur? Karla Flores had all this and more as a young girl living in Peru, and then it was gone, not lost but taken away on purpose. Her father saw the integrity of his beloved family being destroyed by wealth, so he gave it all up and moved to the U.S., eventually buying a home here in Cal Heights.

So now 10-year-old Karla was without wealth, did not speak English and certainly did not fit in with the other children, "I struggled with English, but math I knew well" recalled Karla. She threw herself into her school work, graduating high school at 15 and college at 18. She had an analytical mind and found her calling at California Maritime Academy and became a Marine Mechanical Engineer. "I learned from the men in my class how to be tough and succeed in a maledominated business." Karla spent 9 years circumnavigating the globe on huge container ships, often the only woman on a 15-man crew. She loved visiting foreign countries and earning the respect of her fellow shipmates by hard work and perseverance. Knowing she wanted to settle down, she then pursued an Engineering degree, eventually working for Boeing. Finding working in an office difficult after the excitement of the high seas, she then obtained a Business and Finance Degree.

Despite all this academic success she still felt as if she was looking for something else. She had spent many happy hours with her mother in the kitchen learning how to cook traditional Peruvian foods. Might a culinary career fit the bill? With her analytical mind and penchant for math, she chose baking as her specialty. She worked in the catering business but the real turning point came in 2016 when her brother suggested a food truck might be a good idea. Deciding to specialize in the food from her homeland, she named her business Mikhuna Peruvian Cuisine. She struggled at first but eventually became successful, expanding into catering and even spends time as a personal chef.

The young girl who once thought she lost it all now felt blessed with her success. "I wanted to pay it forward" Karla stated, "and I saw a way food trucks could fill a need in our city." Through help from a friend in the city and the generosity of the Food Truck community she created "Trucksgiving", a yearly event where the food trucks congregate to distribute hundreds of meals to the needy. "I was thrilled at the response from my fellow truckers. Their compassion restored my faith in humanity." It seems Karla's father was right, that true prosperity does not come from wealth but the kindness of the human heart.

As you may be aware, there is currently a national emergency related to the supply and distribution of imported goods arriving in our nation's ports. Given this current national emergency and the Governor's Executive Order to take necessary steps to alleviate the impacts on the system, the City Manager will temporarily waive enforcement of current shipping container stacking and height limits for a period of 90 days from October 22, 2021. During this period, affected operations will be allowed to stack up to four shipping containers without being cited for a Code violation.



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Celebrate the Holidays Victorian-style at the Bembridge House

Long Beach Heritage - a not-for-profit organization supporting historic preservation and advocacy - is ramping up its annual Heritage Holiday Tours at the historic Bembridge House, a Queen Anne Victorian house built in 1906.

Every holiday season, volunteers from a number of historic Long Beach neighborhoods decorate the home in traditional Victorian holiday fashion, both inside and out. This and every year since the tour's inception, California Heights volunteers, including CHNA board members, have decorated the "Front Parlor" of the home.

This year's theme is "The 12 Days of Christmas," and organizers plan to incorporate Hanukkah and Kwanzaa adornments as well. There are six daytime tours on the schedule, along with two adults-only nighttime tours.

Tickets for the daytime tours are \$15 per person; tickets for the two adults-only nighttime tours are \$25 per person. (Money raised from the tours goes toward maintaining the historic home.)

Those holding tickets for daytime tours can drop in to view the property any time between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m., with the last entry at 3:30 p.m. Nighttime-tour ticket-holders are welcome to arrive any time between 6 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., and to stay on-property until 8 p.m. All tour-goers are invited to shop for holiday items, plants, and gifts at the annual Garden Boutique in the home's Carriage House.

Daytime Tours are: Tuesday - Nov. 30, Saturday - Dec. 4, Tuesday - Dec. 7, Saturday - Dec. 11, Tuesday - Dec. 14 and Saturday - Dec. 18. Nighttime Tours (for adults) are: Friday -Dec. 3 and Friday - Dec. 10.

Due to COVID restrictions, masks, worn correctly, are required by law while touring the inside areas of the property. Because wine will be served at the two adults-only nighttime tours, tour-goers will also need to show proof of COVID vaccination to go inside. Volunteers will provide COVID-friendly wrapped snacks to all tour-goers, and will offer wine to the adults on the nighttime tours.

Did You Know?

California Heights and Bixby Knolls share a mutual development history. In 1929, the Deeble-Chapman Corporation, a prominent Southern California real estate development firm, subdivided the last portion of California Heights, from Walnut Avenue to Cherry Avenue, and built some of the first houses. It referred to this portion as "California Heights Terrace."

Later that year, this firm also acquired 120 acres east of San Atlantic Avenue, between Drive and Bixby Road, "...for the development of a residential area on the northern heights of this city that will be to Long Beach what the Wilshire section is to Los Angeles" according to an October 17, 1929 Long Beach Press Telegram article. The development was announced by Jotham W. Bixby, President of the Jotham Bixby Company, which owned almost 1,000 acres of land north of California Heights.

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














IN THE KNOW'LLS What's New? What's Happening?
