Why is California Heights special? Certainly, there are other neighborhoods, perhaps trendier and larger. We do often hear that our homes are charming, but local resident and realtor Andrea Testa said it best, California Heights is special because of "the charm and the friendliness of the people."

We had the pleasure of speaking with Andrea as part of the California Heights fundraising campaign through Long Beach Gives. In fact, she made the first and largest donation to CHNA and inspired others to make donations of their own. These donations have been critical in sustaining our efforts to beautify Cal Heights, as the

pandemic deprived us of our largest fundraiser, the Home and Garden Tour.

Andrea was introduced to the neighborhood after opening Free Spirit Yoga Studio on Atlantic Avenue in Bixby Knolls in 2002. Wanting to live closer to work, she started exploring Cal Heights and loved it, and found a Minimal Traditional fixer-upper in 2003. She cites the charm of the homes, as well as the affordability (at the time!) as some of the reasons she chose Cal Heights.

But, what keeps her here? "I love our neighbors and the sense of community. We all take care of each other, including taking care of each other's pets," Andrea says with a big smile. "We help each other."

Andrea is very generous with her time, serving as a community volunteer in Bixby Knolls and California Heights. She spends time packing food boxes with Food Finders and the Orange County Food Bank, gives blood at the American Red Cross, and you may see her delivering the Cal Heights newsletter to your doorstep.

Andrea also organizes an annual shredding event. On April 9th, from 8 a.m to 11 a.m, you can bring by your old, outdated, and confidential documents that need shredding to 2883 E. Spring Street at Temple Avenue. You will see the truck in the parking lot at the Keller Williams Pacific Estates building where Andrea works as a Realtor. Your documents can be brought in boxes or bags; magazines and newspapers will not be accepted. Andrea and team will help you get your boxes or bags out of your car. You can stay and watch the shredding if so inclined.





He helps achieve that goal by several methods including workshops, art kits, lessons, classroom instruction and yes, even 'sip and savor' wine parties - but instead of everyone copying him you create your vision.

I watched the boy intent on creating a huge black spider with colorful swirls all around it on a T-shirt and I asked him what he liked about being in the studio. Cal Heights Welcomes Too Factor Athletics By Marion Saffery

One of the many things to love about California Heights is its walkability, especially with so many really great small businesses right here in the neighborhood.

In the last issue of In the Heights, we introduced readers to Meat & Vino Market, at the corner of Myrtle on Wardlow. This time we're moving just a couple of doors over to a unique small martial arts and fitness center called Too Factor Athletics.

Too Factor opened in February of last year and is owned and operated by Chuck Seang, who, along with two other coaches, teaches martial arts and fitness classes and provides personal, one-on-one training.

"We pretty much hit the whole spectrum," Seang said. "Myself, I'm an MMA fighter. [The coaches here] fight in all categories—MMA, Muay Thai, Jiu-Jitsu."

Along with martial arts, Too Factor Athletics offers fitness classes, but with a twist. Unlike typical gyms that rely on weight machines and squat racks, Seang and his coaches use unconventional equipment to get their clients in shape.

"We work with free weights, like kettlebells, and unconventional fitness equipment like steel maces and Bulgarian Bags," Seang said. For those uninitiated, Bulgarian Bags are crescent-shaped leather or canvas bags, weighted with sand, and worn around the neck. The bags have flexible handles for upper- and lower-body training and for building grip-strength.

Where in an average gym, machines take up the majority of the floor space, Too Factor Athletics has an open floor with a matted surface and room to move around. Plants fill the entryway, rows of colorful kettlebells line one side of the room, and bags of various sizes and colors hang from the open-beamed ceiling.

Classes are for men, women, and kids, and include Unconventional HIIT (high-intensity interval training), Kickboxing Conditioning, Kettlebell Strong and Fight Team.








There certainly have been some days! Some days have been challenging with lots of questioning. There have been days overcommitted and busy from dawn to dusk. Days of flux, days of routine. Days of rushing from place to place. Days of catching up. But Spring!...these are better days. Let us now shake off our winter coats.

The exciting news is that at the time of this writing we are working on the "Long Beach County Fair" at First Fridays April 1. That's not an April Fool's joke. It's our own version of what you just might see over the summer at other fairs. Inside the Expo Arts Center we host a "Best of Produce" contest with all the local urban farmers showing their crops. We invite all local growers, harvesters, crafters, cottage kitchen folks, and "green" organizations to participate. And you never know what other surprises may be out there. There definitely should be some tasty fair food, music, and...maybe furry, fluffy, and feathered things to pet.

And the days continue working on our mission to keep our district "Clean and Safe" – our Clean Team is out picking up trash and removing any dumped items, our landscaper is keeping things nice and manicured, and CSI Patrol Service keeps a watchful eye on the streets, alleys, and parking lots of the district

Here's a friendly reminder of our current monthly programming: Come walk with us every Saturday with the Bixby Knolls Strollers. We meet at 7:15am at Coffee Bean & Tea Leaf and start the walk promptly at 7:30am. Walks take about an hour and are typically 3.8-miles and routes change each week. Come expand your literary knowledge each month at the Literary Society. We have discussed the greatest literature of the 20th and 21st century, now up 167 books. Meetings are second Wednesdays of the month. And for music lovers, dive into the best albums of all time with our Knights of the Round (Turn)Table, every fourth Thursday of the month, 6:30pm at The Pan restaurant.

Business Recommendation: Sushi Nikkei, 3819 Atlantic Avenue. All reviews have been overwhelmingly positive. Background: The word "Nikkei" is a Japanese term for the Japanese diaspora, it means "Japanese outside of Japan," but only later did the term come to include the cuisine. It's estimated that between the late 19th and mid-20th century two major waves of Asian migrants—many Chinese and Japanese—emigrated to Peru as its new labor work force. Seeking a taste of home, Japanese workers embarked on recreating their cuisine, making do with abundant local ingredients such as tropical fish, quinoa, and aji amarillo peppers—all characteristic ingredients in Nikkei today.

Nikkei has also made a lasting impact on Peruvian's approach to food. Modern application to the country's national dish, ceviche, point to Nikkei influence. Previously the raw fish would be marinated for hours, before Japanese immigrants taught Peruvians to handle the fish more simply and lightly cook it before adding the desired sauce or seasoning—and to great effect. Why wait? Make your reservations now!
