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Living in a Historic District - Restrictions and Benefits

Within the past six weeks, all residents in Cal Heights and the other 17 historic districts in Long Beach were sent a post card from Development Services regarding the rules for remodeling and restoration in a historic district. These cards are sent out every year as a reminder to long-time residents and they provide detailed information for new residents.

Although it is noted in escrow instructions when a home is sold, not everyone is aware of the city-wide Historic District Design Guidelines and the specific guidelines for each district. All this information is available at www.longbeach.gov/ lbds/planning/preservation/districts/guidelines. Along with a building permit for any work valued at more than \$600 on a home, homeowners are also required to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness (COA) for a project. All addresses in historic districts are flagged so city staff can direct residents to apply for a COA.


Many applications for small projects (roof replacement, new fences, exterior painting) can be handled remotely at www.longbeach.gov/lbds/ and many do not require a fee. For larger projects, a meeting with city staff may be required and additions require a review by the Cultural Heritage Commission at a public hearing. It is best that all residents review the guidelines before starting a project. Some changes are not allowed and the City can force the unapproved work to be removed. It is not worth the trouble and expense to go this route.

The California Heights Neighborhood Association (CHNA) is a nonprofit organization with a mission to promote public knowledge and preservation of historic and architectural resources in California Heights, the largest historic district in Long Beach. CHNA projects, including Home Tours, Clean Streets, ReLeaf, and Curb Painting to name a few, enhance the ties that bind and preserve Cal Height's truly community oriented nature.

The benefits of living in a historic district include celebrating unique architectural styles that are beautifully preserved and maintained, a heightened sense of community since most residents share the common goal of historic preservation, and several studies show historic districts enhance property values. A recent benefit includes protection from lot splitting and higher density with the passage of SB 9 and SB 10.

CHNA provides a lot of information on our website and specific questions can be directed to info@calheights.org. A CHNA Board member will get back to you with either an answer to your question or a referral to the right source. We are here to help and encourage the restoration and preservation of Cal Heights! 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
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Cal Heights Looking Back

Aaaah, Kauai. Finally, after our vacation was cancelled two years ago, we are back in paradise. As we relaxed in one of our favorite beachside restaurants watching a magnificent sunset far from home, I glanced upwards where framed T-shirts from elite colleges and exotic locals act as décor... but wait, what? There amongst famous places around the world is a Joe Jost T-shirt! We have spotted Joe Jost T-shirts in many places, not just around town but all over Southern Califonia and even Dublin, Ireland. Once while walking in Germany by the famous castle Neuschwanstein, we spotted two guys ahead of us both sporting the iconic dark blue shirt with the frothy schooner of beer and the big bold white letters; Joe Jost. What inspires people to carry their T-shirts to foreign lands and to declare their love for a local Long Beach dive bar?

Joe Jost was born in a small town in Hungary in 1890. At the age of 12 he apprenticed to become a barber. Always dreaming of America, he sailed to New York at 16 and began his career. He loved to travel and worked his way across the U.S. In Upland, CA he met his future wife, Edith McKean, but continued his wandering ways travelling to exotic locations like Hawaii and even Australia. He finally returned to marry Edith in 1917. He worked at various jobs, served in WWI and finally opened his first establishment in Newport Beach, selling various items including "Near-Beer," but still remained a barber. A back room provided sport for the men including pool and poker. Finally in 1924 he moved to the current location on Anaheim Street, where it has the distinction of being the oldest continually operated tavern west of the Mississippi. For years the bar was a men's only establishment where guys could hang out, drink frosty schooners of beer and eat pickled eggs. It wasn't until the 60's that women could finally get a beer for themselves. Many TV shows, commercials and even movies have used Joe Jost's for filming, but what about the T-shirts?

What started as wear for the staff morphed into a huge phenomenon, selling over 10,000 shirts a year. It has become a rite of passage for some families with the wee ones getting their first onesie with a frosty root beer on it. The Joe Jost's website has a "Wall of Fame" where customers post photos of themselves proudly wearing their T-shirts all over the world: the Great Wall of China, Sydney Opera House, Paris, even the Statue of Liberty. The little tavern that Joe started in 1924 launched a T-shirt seen around the world, so keep an eye out! &

Called "our best local chorus" by the Long Beach Gazette newspapers and recently awarded Best Performance Group in Long Beach, the Long Beach Chorale and Chamber Orchestra is in its fourth decade as a fixture of the Long Beach arts scene.

After being led by Eliza Rubenstein for 19 seasons, the LBCCO is excited to announce new leadership under Artistic Director Matthew Martinez. Prior to joining LBCCO as Guest Conductor in 2016 and starting his tenure as Interim Artistic Director in 2019 during Eliza Rubenstein's sabbatical, Matthew Martinez earned his master's degree from UC Irvine, studying voice and conducting. He was the Music Director at Mesa Verde United Methodist Church in Costa Mesa for 10 years and the Choir Director at Congregation Shir Ha-Ma'alot in Irvine.

The LBCCO has performed many of the great works of Western classical music, and has appeared at Carnegie Hall, the Aquarium of the Pacific, the Long Beach Museum of Art, Rancho Los Alamitos, and the Carpenter Performing Arts Center, as well as with the Long Beach Opera. The group's musical programming is drawn from around the world, and from the Middle Ages to the present day.

The LBCCO is Long Beach's only all-volunteer community masterworks chorus; all LBCCO members are volunteers motivated by their love of singing. Their motto - "great music, up close"- reflects the group's commitment to presenting masterworks at an accessible price, and pride themselves on working within the community to offer under-served music lovers the opportunity to experience live classical and culturally diverse music.

Under their new leadership, the Long Beach Chorale's 2022/2023 season, begins with a performance of Vivaldi's Gloria in December.

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Hello, I Must Be Going




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IN THE KNOW'LLS What's New? What's Happening? by Blair Cohn, Executive Director BKBIA


