# 2022 LONG BEACH GIVES CAMPAIGN A BIG SUCCESS!

On September 22, Long Beach residents participated in what has now become an annual tradition, Long Beach Gives, the citywide, online giving event that raises awareness and inspires residents to donate to local nonprofits. This year's event saw 8,551 donations to 232 organizations, for a total of \$1.97 million.

The California Heights Neighborhood Association (CHNA) participated for the second time and, thanks to you, was very successful in raising money to support the neighborhood! More than 40 donors contributed over \$9,000! This funding will help keep our alleys, streets, and freeway ramps clean, as well as maintain our historic lampposts, produce informative newsletters, and host future community events like the Home Tour.

A special thank you to local realtor Andrea Testa for initiating a \$1,000 matching donation for the second year in a row. Local realtor Trina Rufo, who grew up in California Heights, kept the momentum going with a \$2,500 donation – thank you both!



# Cal Heights Looking Back (cont'd)

On his April birthday, his Dad would take him to see the Indians play in Cleveland's Memorial Stadium, a behemoth structure on the shores of Lake Erie, thoughtlessly built so freezing wind could roar in. Living in California, he saw Dodgers games, and after we married even had season tickets to the Angels for years.

Then something started to happen. If his work required travel to a major league city, he would try to catch a game. Then if we vacationed near a stadium we would go. Then after retirement we would purposely travel to a city just to see a game. Until there was only one left, the Miami Marlins.

Long Beach doesn't have a major league stadium, but it does have a rich baseball history starting in 1910 with the Long Beach Clothiers of the Trolley League, so called because they could get to all the games by the trolley. In 1924 Recreation Park opened four fields that hosted spring training for the 1933 New York Giants and countless college, high school and little league games. Blair Field opened in 1956 hoping to lure a major league team, but it never happened. Several minor league teams - the Rockets, the Breakers and the Armada, all played here. In 1997 the city briefly joined the resurgence of Ladies Professional League with the Long Beach Aces! Our High Schools have produced many major leaguers including Ron Fairly, Bobby Grich and Tony Gwynn.

The great Yogi Berra once said "If the world was perfect, it wouldn't be." But once in awhile you might get lucky and have the perfect day. We had great seats right behind home, the beer was cold and the hotdogs hot, and while taking countless photos of Steve and telling everyone within earshot of his accomplishment. The fan in front of us arranged for a member of the Marlins' staff to present Steve with an autographed ball congratulating him on seeing all 30 major league stadiums! Perfect.



**Police Community Meeting**

Thank you to those who joined CHNA on September 22 at the Expo Art Center for a community meeting with North Division Patrol Resource Officer Abe Mercado. Christopher Martinez, and Neighborhood Services Specialist Erika Moreno. They spent about one hour talking with residents and conveyed one common message - communication.

Communicate with the police department - Officer Mercado strongly recommended if you "See Something, Say Something." If you have any questions, concerns or would like to report a crime call 9-1-1 or the non-emergency dispatch at (562) 435-6711.

Communicate with neighbors - Getting to know your neighbors is a great way to not only build community but a way to build a safe community. Many blocks in Cal Heights have established Community Watch programs which brings residents together. Erika Morena can help interested residents connect with officers for guidance.

Additionally they discussed solutions to some of our most common challenges including keeping windows and doors locked, not leaving any items in cars, and taking steps to prevent catalytic converter theft by investing in an anti-theft cable locking device or catalytic converter shield or getting catalytic converters etched with VIN numbers. There are challenges in the police department, which is currently 60 officers short, but with increased communication we can work toward making Cal Heights even safer.

**3rd Saturday of each month - meet at Wardlow & Lime** Volunteers clean Wardlow from Atlantic west to the 405 freeway. (This includes a freeway cleanup and any volunteers interested in cleaning the freeway must go through training)

**4th Saturday of each month - meet at Bixby & Olive** Volunteers partner with Long Fellow Clean Team and clean the area around Longfellow and Hughes Middle School.

**5th Saturday of each month - meet at Wardlow & Lime** Volunteers will decide on a location to be cleaned.



the last ones on the street. Tired and satisfied, we all walked home to evaluate our loot. But even with the stockpile of mini Snickers or Three Musketeer bars, it was the taste of that sicky caramel draped on those cold apples that was the ultimate prize. Oh, how I miss those.
