# Long Beach Historical Society's Cemetery Tour - October 28

The Historical Society of Long Beach holds its 27th Annual Historical Cemetery Tour on Saturday, October 28th from 9:00am to 3:00pm. Join in the fun as costumed actors perform the stories of those buried at Sunnyside and Long Beach Municipal Cemeteries, located at 1095 and 1151 E. Willow Street, respectively. The event features eight graveside presentations with actors portraying the life of the person lying at rest. Stories feature those who had extraordinary lives, extraordinary deaths, and ordinary folks who helped the community grow.

The Harnett family and their pacific squab and poultry farm will be featured this year. Claudine Burnett has come out with a book about the early family and will be available to sign books. This year, Sharon Diggs-Jackson will share the history of early African American families. June Miyamoto Donovan will share the legacy of Japanese American Terminal Islanders through traditional dance.

Bring lunch and your own refreshments and take advantage of our rest area under the trees. Bring your water bottle for a free fill-up from Long Beach Utilities.

Performances last 10 minutes and are repeated every 20 minutes until 2:40 pm. Arrive by noon for the full experience. Carpooling is recommended and bicycle parking is available. 
















# **Cal Heights Looking Back**

In his inaugural address in 1961, President John F. Kennedy spoke these immortal words, "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country." His intent was to galvanize young people into service, especially volunteerism. A key component of being a volunteer is the act of donating your time and energy to a greater cause and help change the lives of a community. For the last several years, Cal Heights has benefitted from the extraordinary efforts of two women dedicated to work for the benefit of our community.

Karen Highberger and her husband Lou Gaudio moved to Cal Heights in 1993. Karen is that rare woman who, despite having her own business, seems to be a part of everything from Long Beach Heritage to California Heights Neighborhood Association (CHNA) to writing applications for grants funding several neighborhood projects. She has been invaluable in spearheading the Lamppost Restoration project and the Cal Heights Home Tour. Her encyclopedic knowledge of people, places, and policy is remarkable.

Stacey Morrison and her husband Andy moved to Cal Heights in 2003. Stacey has been intrigued by the neighborhood, especially after seeing the mural on the side of Nino's Restaurant. Wanting to place an ad for her graphic design business, she met John Royce, the former president of CHNA. Soon, Stacey was active on the board, becoming Vice President, editor of the newsletter, volunteering for Clean Streets, and helping to plant and care for trees through the ReLeaf program.

Sadly, for us in Cal Heights, these ladies have decided to step down from the CHNA board after years of service. They epitomize the volunteerism that President Kennedy hoped to inspire. Sitting with Karen and Stacey to discuss their many accomplishments, I had to smile as they began to brainstorm on new projects for the neighborhood. They both emphasized the importance of fostering strong community ties by getting out there and meeting their neighbors, as well as ways to encourage young people to get involved. I know they will never stop trying to make Cal Heights a better place. They are an inspiration and I thank them from the bottom of my heart.

So don't just ask what your neighborhood can do for you, instead help in any way you can – pick up a piece a trash here and there, check on an elderly neighbor, have a street party and volunteer when you can. We have a wonderful neighborhood, and with a little help from everyone, it will continue to surround us with beauty, provide us with friendship and enrich our lives.

# From the 5th District



Hello Cal Heights Neighbors,

As school resumes and we embrace the fall season, I hope you all are doing well. With nearly 75,000 students and staff returning city-wide, let's unite to ensure their safety. Please exercise caution at crosswalks, obey crossing guards, and follow traffic signals and signs, including stop and yield signs. Stay vigilant, watch out for

pedestrians, cyclists, and plan for potential school-related traffic delays. Together, we can make this school year safe.

On Sept. 5th, my colleagues and I approved the FY 24 City Budget. This \$3.2 billion budget aligns with the City's Strategic Vision-2030. It addresses critical areas such as our urban forest and green space, continued investment in youth and neighborhoods, infrastructure and traffic enhancements, and the pressing concerns surrounding housing and homelessness. We also allocated \$100,000 to the Historical Society of Long Beach to support educational programs that will enlighten future generations about our City's rich history. There were also allocations to assist in neighborhood clean-up. This budget is forward-looking and I'm proud to have supported it. 







