

What's up at 36th and Orange?

If you've missed the buzz, a signal installation is in process. Long requested by some Cal Heights residents for easier pedestrian crossings between the east and west sides of the neighborhood, and by Orange Avenue residents wishing to slow traffic, it was approved after a series of community meetings with former Councilmember Uranga, Chief Traffic Engineer, Dave Roseman, and local residents. Since 36th Street is closer to the midway point between the traffic lights at Bixby and Wardlow roads, it was chosen over 37th Street.

As the only signal within the historic district boundaries, current Councilmember, James Johnson, invited Public Works to work with CHNA to create a design that reflects the historic character of the neighborhood. We think you will be pleased with the outcome!

The two historic light standards that were removed at the intersection several weeks ago were not lost. Restored by CHNA in 2007, we suggested the lamps be reused at the corner of 37th and Myrtle, where the originals had been damaged and removed. The new signal posts will each be topped with the same replicate decorative lamppost tops that adorn the other restored posts on Orange Avenue. Costs were kept in check by using simple modern posts and signal booms with vintage style bases, all painted Long Beach blue. For the new ADA ramps, we chose unpainted cast iron traction domes. They will form a protective patina, like that of manhole covers, that won't need to be recoated repeatedly, saving on maintenance costs and lending a vintage quality. The cast iron domes could be used in more LB ADA ramps in the near future. Finally, CHNA's seal will be cast into the base of the signal posts and sidewalks adjacent to the ramps were repaired.

New utility lines are in place and ready for the signals and lamps when they are received from the manufacturers. We'll plan to have photos for our next issue and on our facebook page!

president's message A Message FROM JOHN ROYCE

As we settle in to 2012, we look back on a good year for CHNA. On behalf of Cal Heights, I thank each and every one of our volunteers and supporters who contributed to that success. Whether it's five minutes, five hours or fifty, every second a volunteer donates is appreciated.

The 2011 Home and Garden tour hosted hundreds of guests and raised thousands of dollars to continue our ongoing community projects. Led by board member, Karen Highberger, our lamppost project is our most expensive undertaking. The flush of new cash led our CHNA board to dedicate another \$10,000 to lamppost restoration for 2012, and in December it was announced that CHNA would be awarded the Contextual In-Fill Award from Long Beach Heritage for our efforts. Home and Garden Tour homeowners, Craig and Christine Bouma, will receive the Restoration and Preservation Award.

Under the leadership of Clean Streets chairperson, Stacey Morrison, our team of volunteers met every single Thursday in 2011, somehow dodging last winter's rains, only to be caught by an odd early summer morning rainfall which dampened our hair but not our spirits. We collected another 300 plus bags of litter from the commercial corridors around Cal Heights and beyond, removed graffiti and illegal signs and joined forces with our 7th District Council Office, Litter Free Long Beach and community volunteers to clean over 3.5 tons of litter and debris from Willow Gulch. With the number of volunteers swelling, we combined Clean Streets and ReLeaf efforts to water, weed and prune the maturing trees from 33rd Street to Bixby Road, as well as the Lot 33 volunteer project at 33rd Street.

Clean Streets also heeded the warning to stay off local freeway ramps, which we cleaned for months. The Council Office is facilitating talks with Cal Trans to resume our cleanings at the Atlantic and Long Beach Boulevard ramps with official blessings. As the first and last glimpses when we enter and leave Bixby Knolls, we can't wait to get back to business!

Community collaboration was the buzz word for 2011. We're proud of our integral rolls with the Don and Harold's public easement improvement project at 500 East Wardlow Road, thirty trees at the Oil Operators lot at 33^{rd} /Pasadena, and two plantings that brought twenty additional trees along 33^{rd} adjacent to the 405 Freeway. ReLeaf continued its commitment to assist with tree care in Bixby Knolls by pruning the growing trees along Atlantic from Carson to San Antonio, as well as water and pruning for the trees at 46^{th} , home of the Uptown Farmers Market. Our board once again supported the Rose Park Restoration Trade Fair and adopted a room at the historic Victorian gem, the Bembridge House, where the annual Christmas Open House fundraiser was one of their most successful to date!

We look forward to another successful year, and we promise to keep you posted as we move forward. Thank you all and Happy New Year! -

Alley Safety

While we enjoy low crime rates, crimes of opportunity are always a possibility amidst the vast urban fabric we share. We pay close attention to the front of our homes, but the convenience of alley access comes with notable concerns. Out of sight should not be out of mind when it comes to our alleys. They can be easy entry points for burglars, but why make it easy? Here are some common tips shared about alley safety at Community Watch meetings.

- Keep gates and fences in good repair and securely locked at all times.
- Securely lock garage doors.
- Train thorny bushes or vines like Bougainvillea, Carissa, and Pyracantha on fences.
- Clean alleys eliminate hiding spaces and keep sightlines clear. Keep trash/recycle bins inside gates and don't deposit furniture, electronics, appliances, etc. in the alley. Besides being illegal, it attracts scavengers and desensitizes residents to alley activity. Many charities schedule free pickups, and for items that cannot be reused, each home is entitled to two free City of Long Beach special pickups per year. Call 570-2876.
- Clearly mark addresses on garages or fences to make reporting criminal activity easier and speed police response.
- Light your alley at night.
- Consider getting a dog.
- Consider an alarm and post the sign in your alley as well as in front.
- Keep doors and windows locked and shades and drapes pulled when you're away to keep peering eyes off of your valuables.

One of the best ways we can all spot suspicious behavior is to know our neighbors well, so build relationships and vested interest through Community Watch today. 



Reuse!


Reuse is one of the buzz words for greener living.

From the 7th District James Johnson Councilmember

Dear Friends,

As we start a new year, I would like to reflect on significant accomplishments from last year that will make California Heights and Long Beach a better place to live.

We made significant progress toward a more fiscally sound city. We passed two historic pension

reform agreements with the Long Beach Firefighters and Police that will help the city live within its means and reduce future cuts to core services. Under the agreement, the Police and Fire pension reforms will save the city \$69 million and \$35.9 million respectively, over the next ten years.

Additionally, the Council approved my motion to reallocate a portion of our residential street repair funds to preventative street maintenance. By maintaining our streets instead of waiting to fix them once they have fallen into disrepair, we can save the city a projected \$30 million over the next 20 years. In the district, our more efficient policies in street and sidewalk repair allowed us to repair 48 blocks of sidewalks (as opposed to the 21 blocks we were previously scheduled to repair) and 24 blocks of streets (as opposed to the 6 blocks previously scheduled). In addition to being more efficient with our money, we increased investment in our city infrastructure (such as streets and sidewalks) by \$5.5 million. Also, the Council approved my motion to increase our treetrimming budget by 70%, resulting in dramatic increases in tree trimming citywide this year. In Cal Heights, we have begun the work on two long-overdue projects--repairing Wardlow Road and installing a stoplight at Orange Avenue and 36th Street.

"First Books at First Fridays," the event where my guests and I read books to kids, celebrated its first full year. Each month, we meet at Dana Branch Library at 5:30 PM. After reading and other free entertainment, we hop on the Big Red Bus, which picks us up at 6:30PM to take us up to enjoy First Fridays in Bixby Knolls. The revitalization of Bixby Knolls continues to gather steam into 2012.

One key accomplishment was increasing access to open space and greening the city. For over 100 years, the property I call California Gardens has been owned by the City and has been sitting dormant. Upon taking office, I knew that we needed to find a way to open this precious resource to the public. Since then I developed a two-track plan for development of this space into a regional park-opening the top four acres in the short term to activate the property while commencing a master planning process to develop the whole property for the long term. The park, when completed, will be the largest in Long Beach west of Redondo Avenue, at over 40 acres. Phase I of the park is scheduled to open this summer, but if you can't wait that long, call our office for one of our tours of the property. Furthermore, throughout the 7^{th} District this year we opened 3 new parks, including the city's largest dog park, and broke ground on two more. Just west of Atlantic, we also planted over 40 trees along the 405 Freeway to keep pollution and noise away from those who live close by.

My staff and I were also busy providing top-notch service to residents in the 7th District. This year we closed 1,283 code enforcement cases, helped home and business owners with over \$160,000 in loans or rebates for improvements (including façade improvements to Dave's Burgers, Walk-In Medical Center, and Alex's Automotive on Atlantic Avenue), removed 1,351 illegal signs that blight neighborhoods, removed 96.5 tons of trash from our parks and streets through a variety of cleanups, planted 135 trees, removed graffiti from 4,709 locations containing 59,223 tags, and closed 2,427 constituent cases.

I'm looking forward to another successful year. In addition to the improvements on Wardlow Road and Orange Avenue, we will be repaving Atlantic Avenue south of Bixby Road. We have several more façade improvements planned on Atlantic, Wardlow and Orange, which will brighten up the neighborhood. I look forward to bringing more information on each of these projects to upcoming community meetings in 2012.




