Neighborhood of the Year?

California Heights has been selected one of four 2012 finalists in the 28th annual Neighborhoods USA (NUSA) National Neighborhood of the Year competition, held this year in Indianapolis, May 23rd through the 26th. NUSA recognizes the outstanding work of neighborhood organizations across the country, volunteering to improve the quality of life in their communities.

To qualify, neighborhood organizations had to complete a neighborhood improvement project or an activity that promotes community building in 2011. For CHNA, we had more than one event that qualified, so we decided to wrap everything into the package that makes all that we do possible, the Home and Garden Tour. That single, very involved, labor intensive volunteer extravaganza finances just about every project we undertake, especially those that involve physical revitalization, like the Cal Heights mural, ReLeaf tree planting and care events, weekly Clean Streets activities, and the single most expensive project, our signature lamppost restoration program. In fact, CHNA dedicated \$10,000 of the 2011 Home Tour Proceeds directly to lamppost restorations! So if you allowed us to open your home, volunteered, purchased a ticket or sponsored an advertisement in the tour booklet, you share in the camaraderie of this award nomination.

Three of our board members will travel to Indianapolis to present our neighborhood at the annual NUSA conference and participate in workshops and tours of local community projects in Indianapolis. The expenses for the trip will be covered by our traveling board members, CHNA funds and community donations. Jet Blue graciously granted two round trip fares, taking a big bite out of a fairly expensive journey. We have plans for some fundraising in the coming weeks, so if you'd like to pitch in, we'd appreciate that very much. Of course we hope we win, but even if we don't, we're proud to be recognized as a finalist, proud of all we do and the community we know and love.

president's message A MESSAGE FROM JOHN ROYCE

If there's one thing we're just not used to at CHNA, it's asking for donations. CHNA continues to be a dues-free organization, fueled by volunteer energy. Sure, we have our projects that require cash to change hands, but typically participants get something in return; a tree (planted no less!), a lovely lamppost top and shiny plaque with your name on it, a ticket to the tour, a new address on the curb or an ad in The Heights . . . You get the picture. But asking for donations just for the sake of donations? It's just never been a big part of what we do!

If you read the front page, you know three board members are heading to Indianapolis to represent Cal Heights and present our association as a finalist in the NUSA Neighborhood of the Year Awards. This trip is pricey. And unlike past organizations that have represented Long Beach, CHNA does not qualify for public funding. It's one of the reasons we figured out how to make and manage our own money! While our board members are committed no matter what the fundraising outcomes, we feel we should at least attempt to ease the financial burden on those willing to represent Cal Heights in Indiana, and ease the financial drain to a treasury the board, our homeowners and volunteers work so hard to fill each Home Tour season. With the 2013 tour a long way off and a very expensive lamppost project on the horizon, it seems the right time to request donations.

I want to personally thank Jet Blue for stepping in as a neighborhood partner to donate two round trip tickets, saving our board members and treasury over \$800 in travel expenses. Our request letter was delivered through Councilmember Johnson, who ensured it landed on the appropriate desk. Jet Blue responded swiftly and positively:

We are pleased to let you know that we are able to support your organization because we believe in your cause, and feel that it is an appropriate and meaningful use of our charitable resources.

Roxanne's Lounge also offered a month of "Pink Wednesdays" in June to help raise funds for our trip. Each Wednesday, Roxanne's donates ten percent of lunch and dinner proceeds to a local non-profit. So stop in for a sandwich or munchies while you catch a game, shoot some pool, or meet up with friends at a local spot where, if we play it right, everybody will know your name!

Historic District Leaders Meeting

On Saturday, April 21st a meeting was held with leaders of various Historic Districts and Long Beach Heritage in Cal Heights. The purpose of the meeting was to gather information from the districts regarding concerns in their neighborhoods, successes they've had with fundraising, community outreach, working with their Councilperson and preservation efforts in general in Long Beach. Work sheets were sent out to the heads of the Districts and they were returned at the meeting. Information from these work sheets will be compiled and forwarded to Development Services Staff at the City to be used for the city-wide Historic District Meeting sometime in June or July as well as Long Beach Heritage.

Districts in attendance included Bluff Park, Hellman-Craftsman Village, Bluff Heights, Belmont Heights-Eliot Lane, Linden Ave., Rose Park/Rose Park South, Drake Park-Willmore City and Cal Heights. The Advocacy Committee of Long Beach Heritage is working hard to support the various Districts in their preservation efforts. As there is strength in numbers, the joining of the Districts with Long Beach Heritage to form "one voice" will be helpful in working with City Staff on issues important to preservation in general and the Districts in particular.

Melinda Roney, President of Long Beach Heritage, stated that the various Districts should feel free to seek help from Long Beach Heritage and that LBH needs the support of the District residents as well. Various LBH Advocacy Committee members are working as liaisons with City Staff, the Planning Commission, City Council and the Cultural Heritage Commission to make sure vital information is relayed to concerned parties.

As it was stated at the meeting, Long Beach is a community of neighborhoods and we must work hard to maintain them. The Historic Districts in Long Beach are the older neighborhoods and they have even more challenges. The consensus at the meeting was very positive and everyone has a sense of accomplishment.

We all look forward to the City-wide meeting in early summer. Many issues will be addressed at that time: the status of the Mills Act program, the City-wide Historic District Ordinance, the updating of the various District ordinances and the Historic Preservation Element that was adopted by the City last year. It's been a few years since the last City-wide meeting. We will let you know the date as soon as it's scheduled. *

Lamppost Restoration Project "Two-fer" Program Kicks Off!

Hopefully everyone is aware of the grant CHNA received from the Long Beach Navy Memorial Heritage Association in the amount of \$25,000. CHNA pledged \$10,000 from Home Tour receipts toward the project as well. We are using this opportunity to kick off a very ambitious fundraising drive for completion of the lamppost restoration project. For every lamppost sponsored (\$725), CHNA will restore an additional lamppost on the same block at no charge. Only the privately sponsored lamppost would have the plaque that can be engraved. Please remember that the plaques have four spaces for engraving, so it's a great opportunity to share the expense and the glory with friends or neighbors. It is also a wonderful way to commemorate a special family member or event. And it's tax deductible! Many streets are close to completion, so it's time to take advantage of the offer and finish your block.

Our goal is two-fold with this offer. We want to encourage more private sponsorships and reward those who participate and also we want the community to select the location of the new lamppost tops. Where to place the lamppost tops is a much more difficult decision this time around. Two years ago, we used the grant money and the CHNA funds to complete the major streets in Cal Heights: Wardlow Road, 36th Street, 37th Street and Bixby Road. Previously, CHNA funds paid for the lampposts on Orange Avenue. CHNA wants to be fair in the placement of these new lamppost tops.

Please help us and your historical neighborhood by sponsoring a lamppost and getting an additional one for free! Think how beautiful your block will look! The restored lamppost tops enhance our neighborhood and increase property values.

As with everything, prices keep increasing. CHNA would love to get enough private sponsors to complete the project. Please consider a sponsorship. 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

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
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From the 7th District


