Cal Heights Block Party - June 24th!



President's Message

The tall, slim tower first catches your eye. You are drawn to the grooves between the red clay tiles above the tower and along the building's roofline. Then, the uninhabited front porch calls for you to enter, sit, and ponder awhile. But alas, you are not invited in, and instead your eyes and mind are transported back to reality, to the cold chain link fence and worn windscreen that surrounds this diamond in the rough. I am talking about the historic fire station next to the Water Department headquarters.

Built in 1941-42, this Spanish Colonial Revival-styled building served as Fire Station No. 14 for the City of Long Beach and was designed by local architect, Jess J. Jones (1889-1973), who also designed the first buildings at Memorial Hospital. A number of years ago, Fire Station No. 14 was sold and most recently served as a medical marijuana dispensary. It has been vacant for more than ten years.

Since my wife and I moved into California Heights in 2015, we have noticed this gem, staring right back at us. It serves as a landmark, in a figurative and literal sense, not only greeting you as you enter and leave Cal Heights, but as a visual focal point as you look down from Gardenia Avenue.

I write not to express sorrow, but to plant seeds of hope and desire. This beautiful fire station served its purpose, to support Long Beach's firefighters who in turn served us and protected us. As it sits vacant, it awaits an unknown destiny. It deserves to continue its service to the community, through a sensitive, adaptive re-use. Let me know your thoughts at info@calheights. org.



fices of our fallen heroes and may their memory inspire us to strive for a better future.



The City is working to resolve this issue through a variety of operational and administrative adjustments, and we apologize for the inconvenience.

Free Classes, Activities and Events for Seniors: Who Knew?

Just by registering, Long Beach seniors ages 50 and up can take part in an ongoing array of enriching classes, social activities, and informational events at six different Senior Centers citywide. The best part? It's FREE!

The City's Senior Program, brought to us by the Long Beach Parks, Recreation & Marine Department, offers classes and workshops like yoga, acrylic painting, and Tai Chi Chih; and social activities like book and walking clubs, bingo, knitting and more.

The Senior Center for our Cal Heights neighborhood is at the Expo Center in Bixby Knolls, and runs Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Seniors can join most activities on a drop-in basis, but they will be asked to register upon their first visit. Some special events do require pre-registration, due to their popularity.

A monthly activities calendar is posted online (see below), however, according to recreation assistant Araceli Oviedo, it doesn't vary much. "We try to keep it as consistent as possible for our patrons, so they know what to expect on different days," she said. Some of the center's offerings, such as the Able ARTS Workshop, are produced in collaboration with other organizations and groups. All the materials needed to take part are provided, free of charge. "Able ARTS Work is a neighboring nonprofit group here at The Expo," Oviedo said. "They've been holding hour-long workshops with our seniors once a month."

On occasion, the program buses participants to excursions offsite. Some of these, like trips to the Getty Museum, are purely for pleasure; others, like a field trip to the Long Beach Transit Department, are also educational.

To view the monthly program calendar, visit www.longbeach. gov/parks, and select "Recreation Programs" on the left. From there, click the "Senior Programs" button, scroll to the bottom of the ensuing page to "Expo Center" and click "Calendar of Events". Follow the program (@longbeachparks) on social media as well.

"It's hard to cram so much fun into three days," Oviedo said. "We just look forward to continuing to add more participants, and to having a great summer here at the Senior Center."

Long Beach Community Garden – One of My Favorite Places

I began gardening at the Long Beach Community Garden two years ago and I must say heading over to the garden is something I look forward to every Saturday (after picking up trash with Clean Streets!)

Located across the street from the Nature Center in El Dorado East Regional Park is an 8½-acre parcel of land with over 300 gardening plots. Each plot is 20 feet by 30 feet for Long Beach gardeners to grow all their desired summer and winter crops. Gardeners have access to water, compost, mulch, wheel barrels, shovels, an herb garden, a flower garden, and the daily pickings from the citrus and stone fruit orchard. All the produce from the orchard is placed in the Welcome Center and is always the first place I stop to get oranges, grapefruits, mandarins, avocados, loquats, or whatever else was picked that day.

The idea of a community garden originated at the Honor Farm located at Dovey Drive and Carson Street (at where the Long Beach Towne Center is currently located). That's where in 1976 the City Council approved the farm to become a community garden. It was a 6½-acre site with water access and rich sandy loam soil. In 1996, the garden was relocated to El Dorado Park East and has been thriving ever since.

To become a gardener here you must be a Long Beach resident and submit an application. It is \$160 per year and if you grow one too many zucchinis or tomatoes all extra crops can be donated and garden volunteers deliver this produce to various Long Beach food banks. 





